

DEMOCRATS HAVE A CELEBRATION

Addressed by Bryan and Ex-Vice President Stevenson.

REORGANIZERS ROASTED.

Their Plan Means Retreat—Encouraging Indications—W. H. Hearst is Given a Good Send-off.

Des Moines, Ia., April 2.—Three hundred Democrats attended the Jeffersonian banquet tonight and the demand for tickets could not be met.

The attendance was representative of the Democratic party throughout the state.

The principal speakers were W. J. Bryan and former Vice President A. A. Stevenson.

W. R. Hearst, who had been announced as a speaker, sent a letter, which was read, in which he continued devotion by Democrats to the political principles of Jefferson.

Mr. Stevenson, who spoke first, gave his views as to the proper policy for the Democratic party in the coming presidential campaign.

He said in "Harmony, like happiness, is not secured by seeking for it; it comes as the reward of right-doing. Harmony is to be felt, not a thing to be talked about."

The mere mention of harmony suggests differences that need reconciliation, and the talk of harmony among those who disturbed it, left the party and lent their influence to the enemy.

It naturally recalls the issues that created disturbance and naturally suggests the inquiry whether the prodigals have repented or demand repentance of the party.

The difference which existed on the money question still exists, for while the Republicans are boasting that the money question is settled, money is tight in the great financial centers and the financiers of this country are resorting to extraordinary methods to get enough money into circulation to carry on business.

On the trust question the same line of cleavage appears. The men who threatened a panic if silver was re-issued now threaten a panic if the trusts are disturbed, and the trust companies are casting about for a Democratic candidate so much like a Republican that the trusts can rest easy in matter which candidate is elected.

Reorganization means retreat, and that means demoralization and disunity. From the low standpoint of expediency retreat could not be justified.

The party polled nearly a million more votes in support of the Chicago and Kansas City platforms than were polled in Cleveland, even before his political position was made known.

There is a soreness about the arguments made by the reorganizers that is to be dispensed with any meaning or unkindness. It is really insulting to a man to intimate that he is not as important as the trust companies are casting about for a Democratic candidate so much like a Republican that the trusts can rest easy in matter which candidate is elected.

Later she raced back and forth over the course totally submerged. The boat traveled 12 miles, coming up at the end of each two mile spur.

Today the Grampus, a sister vessel of the Pike, will be given a surface trial and on Saturday will dive below.

TO DISSOLVE PARLIAMENT.

Conservatives Will Go to the Country On Question of Irish Reforms.

London, April 30.—The correspondent of the Daily Chronicle at Dublin claims to have the authority of a member of the present government for the statement that the government intends to dissolve parliament at the end of the present session, the general elections being held in the autumn.

The leading plank in the Conservative platform at the elections, affirms the correspondent, will be an enormous extension of local government in Ireland providing for the control of the administration of the police.

It is understood, further asserts the correspondent, that the colonial secretary, Mr. Chamberlain, warmly supports the movement for a legislative council. There has been trouble between the two which will have the control of the Irish police.

According to the supposed plans of the government, the Dublin chamber will consist of representatives of the Irish county councils and will deal with local matters such as gas, water and railroads.

Inventory of Mrs. Fair's Estate.

San Francisco, April 2.—The inventory and appraisement of the estate of the late Caroline D. Fair, wife of Charles Fair, has been filed in the county clerk's office.

The appraisement is based on the supposition that Mrs. Fair died in the automobile accident in France prior to her husband, and it is also merely an appraisement of her separate property.

The showing is that Mrs. Fair's entire estate in this state is worth \$71,372.

Killed in an Arizona Saloon.

Tucson, Ariz., April 2.—The Big Adobe saloon at Tucson has been the scene of another fight and John Crossen, as a result, lies dead with a bullet in his heart.

He was killed by Frank Wilson, a deputy sheriff of Cochise county, who was called into the saloon to interfere in a fight in which Crossen had engaged.

INTERESTING EXPERIMENTS.

Signals and Speech Sent Through Ground Without Wires.

New York, April 2.—An interesting series of demonstrations has been given at Alexandra palace of the apparatus for transmission and reception of signals and speech through the ground.

Without the use of wires, says the London representative of the Tribune, the inventors, a young Swedish electrical engineer, trained in the United States, and a Devonshire electrician, were present, with Sir Girard Smith and other experts.

The experiments were conducted without the pretenses that a perfect system of installation had been worked out and the practicability of dispensing with wires and masts and using earth currents of electricity for commercial, military and naval purposes was illustrated.

HOME MARKET CLUB BANQUET

Senator Lodge Was the Guest of Honor.

WENT AFTER DEMOCRATS.

Republicans Deplore the Fact That Any Cruelties Were Ever Committed by Americans in Philippines.

Boeton, Mass., April 2.—At the Home Market club banquet given here tonight Senator Lodge was the guest of honor.

In the course of an address delivered by him he said: "A fortnight since certain Democrats of this neighborhood held a continuous performance one day at Faneuil hall in regard to the Philippine islands. It is needless, because it is futile, to put the facts before the persons who cultivate this particular topic for political purposes.

The facts go before them and the next day they tell the same old falsehoods, just as if there were no such things as facts in the world. The charge is that I have suppressed evidence and balked inquiry into affairs in the Philippines. My answer is a brief history of what has been done by the Republican party in the senate and by the war department.

"We Republicans deeply deplore the fact that any cruelties were ever committed by any American officer or any American soldier upon anyone in the Philippines. We believe that any officer or man guilty of such conduct should be tried by court-martial, and we believe that that has been done. But we also believe that some consideration should be given to the circumstances under which these cruelties occurred. We remember their provocation. We deplore and censure the cruelties they may have committed, but we do not forget, as the other side forgets, the cruelties that our men endured.

"They got together and cry out against the cruelties inflicted upon the Filipinos, but they have no word for Private O'Hearn, roasted all day over a slow fire and backed to death with bullets; no word of reprobation for the murderers of the wounded American sailor buried alive in the sands of Luzon; no thought of the men who assassinated Little Noa, the midshipman, when he asked them for water. Why, when they are telling of events in the Philippines, did they pass by in silence the surprise and massacre at Balinging?

"The Republican party has passed, in both sessions of this Congress, wise, far-reaching legislation for the benefit of the Philippines. They will pass more in the years to come, but there is one thing that the Republican party will not do: it will not further seek to hound down officers and men of the army of the United States for events which happened two years ago, and which have been tried by the courts and before the country."

ANCIENT HIBERNIANS.

Do Not Countenance Violence Against Stage Irishman.

Syracuse, N. Y., April 2.—James E. Dolan, national president of the Ancient Order of Hibernians, has issued the following official statement: "The Ancient Order of Hibernians does not recommend or countenance any violence in doing away with the 'Baboon-faced stage Irishman' but are determined to wipe out the flagrant insult to our people, and Irishmen all over the country have joined in the movement, as have many leading newspapers.

"We recommend that our members withhold the patronage of themselves and their families from theaters and amusement halls, where the outrageous and insulting attractions are permitted to be produced."

HOME GUARD ORGANIZATIONS

Were Not Part of Army During the Civil War.

Duluth, Minn., April 3.—Members of home guard organizations formed during the civil war were not part of the army of the United States, according to a decision which has just been announced by Secy. Hitchcock of the interior department.

The question arose of a member of the Missouri Home Guards to obtain the special privileges of a soldier, in entering government land, and the decision will affect work in the property on which proof has been made.

Secy. Hitchcock holds that members of the home guard organizations were never mustered into the service of the general government, and could not be construed as part of the military organization of the United States.

The effect of such a decision will be far reaching, not only in the Duluth district, where the question arose, but in other land offices over the country.

TRUSTIES SKIP OUT

From the State Penitentiary at Boise, Idaho.

Boise, Ida., April 2.—Two trustees at the state penitentiary, Charles Williams and A. Jensen, failed to respond to roll call this evening and are still missing from the institution. They were engaged in administration building and had but a short time to serve.

Williams was brought down from Lincoln county and Jensen from Kootenai, both convicted of larceny.

Jensen was only recently made a trustee, but Williams had been one for several months.

The prison officials were prompt in getting after the runaways and expect to recapture them without difficulty.

Canadian Alaskan Staff Working

New York, April 2.—The Canadian Alaska staff says a London dispatch to the Tribune. Minister Sifton and under study Joseph Pope have been closely occupied with preliminary consultations, in which their counsels and officials of the foreign office took part.

Their secretary, A. P. Collier, says a strong staff of men will be engaged for the next three months in working up the Canadian case for presentation to the Alaskan commission. There will be a thorough investigation of the records of the foreign office bearing upon the Anglo-Russian treaty of 1825, and no pains will be spared to establish the Canadian case.
