NAVAL RECRUITS.

Candidates for Enrollment Will be Received Here Next Week.

The recruiting party of the United States navy, now at Provo, will come to Salt Lake the latter part of the week in time to open a recruiting office in this city on Monday next.

The office will be located at room 226 Dooly block, and will receive applications on one week, during which time it is hoped a good many young men will be secured for the service.

All candidates for enrollment must pass a physical examination, showing that they are free from disqualifying diseases. They will also be required to pass the physical examination and must be able to read and write English, and on first enlistment will be allowed a month's clothing worth \$45, in addition to their pay ranging from \$15 to \$30 per month, according to rating.

Apprentices, third class, from 15 to 18 years of age, will receive \$9 per month. The term of enlistment is four years for landmen, and during minority for apprentices. Should a man re-enlist within a period of four months from the date of his discharge, he will receive a bonus of four months' pay, and an addition to his monthly pay of \$1.30 for each re-enlistment. Every opportunity will also be given for advancement.
