W. A. CLARK GOES THROUGH TO BUTTE

San Pedro People Meet Him in Ogden This Morning.

WILL DISCUSS ON TRAIN.

No Details Given Out Until After the Meeting—H. C. Kerens on the Situation.

Owing to the delay on the Southern Pacific Senator W. A. Clark did not come to Salt Lake this morning. Instead H. C. Kerens, first vice president, T. E. Gibbon, third vice president and general counsel; Senator Thomas Kearns, director; C. O. Whittemore, local legal representative, and the rest of the San Pedro people went up to Ogden at 9:45 this morning in order to meet the president of the road and continue on to Butte with him.

Prior to leaving, Messrs. Kerens and Gibbon both stated that there was nothing to be given out at this time. "Senator Kearns will return right from Butte in order to be present to enter into a contract with the board of directors, President Roosevelt here Friday. We, however, will remain with Mr. Clark until we get this thing all cleaned up satisfactorily," said H. C. Kerens this morning...

Residents along the Heber branch have a great amount of work yet to be done and, for instance, an equitable division of the rolling stock will be a much harder proposition than the purchase of the road. There is a great amount of detail to attend to. Then the transfer of the property will have to be made to the board of directors, after which contracts will be let. When this is done there will be something to talk about for you will see dirt flying in all directions. When his interest in the road there will be some rapid construction under way. When the last spike is driven it will be time enough to make a big hurrah.

Mr. Kerens went on to state that there were some portions of the route where construction in the summer time would be practically impossible, owing to the heat. These sections, he thought, would be negotiated during the winter months. In regard to the feasibility of a trust company for Salt Lake, Mr. Kerens was not inclined to be very communicative. "It all depends," he said, "on the interest which local money takes in it."

USE OF SANTA FE TRACKS.

In connection with the construction of the San Pedro Arthur G. Wells, general manager of the Santa Fe, is quoted in Los Angeles as saying: "You need state," said Mr. Wells, "that an agreement has been entered into between President Ripley of the Santa Fe and President Clark of the Salt Lake road, whereby the latter is to be permitted to use Santa Fe tracks for its trains from Ogden to Daguerre under the usual arrangements."

THE MARINE CASE.

MOFFAT ROAD.

Another Appropriation Made—3,000 More Men to be Put to Work.

A special meeting of the board of directors of the Denver, Northwestern & Pacific was held in Denver on Saturday afternoon when an appropriation of \$3,000,000 was made for additional construction. The appropriation covers the balance of the big tunnel through the main range under James Peak, also the building of the line west on into the Grand river country, and the same will be awarded within the next 90 days, and the work authorized will require about 3,000 men.

After nearly year's strike of the Union Pacific boiler-makers, the contest has been settled satisfactorily to the company and the men, on the basis of the following telegram sent by Mr. Harriman to John McNeil, grand president and organizer of the Brotherhood of Boiler-makers, while Mr. Harriman was hurrying home from the west over the Lake Shore railroad on May 15: "Rather than permit a condition to be brought about whereby men's homes would be broken up and their families and children be permitted to suffer through no fault of their own, I will recommend to Mr. Bert, president of the Union Pacific and suggest to you for consideration the following: 'The Union Pacific boiler-makers' strike on the Southern Pacific and other lines to be called off; matter of piece work to be left to the men themselves.'
