CHANGE IN RULES.

Football to be Different According to Walter Camp.

New Haven, Conn., June 8—The football rules committee, which held a meeting at a dining-room table in this city for revision of rules, reached an agreement to make alterations in the rules, according to a statement by Walter Camp, chairman of the committee. Mr. Camp said: "We practically agreed to make changes in rules governing the number of men who are to be kept in the rush line and with regard to the quarterback. We will start any time next season which will require that between the two 5-yard lines from one 5-yard line to the other 10 yards be required in the line inside the 25-yard line there will be no such requirement. It will allow the quarterback in the same section of the field to run with ball provided he does not cross the scrimmage at least five yards from where it is put into play."

Trotting Horses Sold.

New York, June 9—Twenty-five trotting bred carriage horses have been disposed of at a public auction sale in this city for \$19,125. The highest price, \$1,000, was paid by S. Bywater for a pair of chestnut geldings, one of which won the Blue Ribbon in single harness at the Durand Horse Show last spring.

Chicago, Ill., June 9—John A. Drake has signed Jockey Charley Gray for the remainder of the present season at a good salary and the boy will wear the Drake colors at Saratoga and the other big eastern tracks where Lester Reiff is not permitted to ride. Gray can make 15 cents a race and will have the mount on one of Drake's horses in the Derby and Lester Reiff on the other.

Savable a Favorite.

Chicago, June 8—John A. Drake's Savable, at present the favorite in the American Derby, gave McChesney a beating at Harlem today in one of the most false run races of the year.

RIVER NOW RECEDED.

Crest of Mississippi Flood Has Passed St. Louis.

St. Louis, June 9.—At the rate of from eight to 10 miles an hour the Mississippi river, over half a mile wide and 90 feet deep in the channel, is pouring past St. Louis toward the gulf. For a week the river, slowly at first, and then more rapidly, has been receding. Its ordinary confines until on June 8, 1903, it had established a high water mark of 37.5 feet, the highest flood tide since the same mark was unbrokenly established in 1888. The river is now receding. Thirty feet above low water mark is the danger line for St. Louis and the river rose 7 1/2 feet above the danger line.

The crest of the flood has passed St. Louis and any further destruction that would be wrought by the possible crumbling of undermined buildings, and to the country below this point, danger of which is lessened by the spreading of the river over the low lands.

Rapid falling of the water, it is expected, will quickly drain the Mississippi section of the Illinois state, where the property loss will be heaviest and repairs to the damaged property will soon be possible.

Reports are coming in from Madison, Granite City and Venice, which indicate that the death list may be larger than first estimated. At least 20 people have been drowned in that vicinity. A report was received early today from Newport, a small town three miles from Granite City, that a school building in which are sheltered 50 children was tottering and threatened to collapse at any moment. Aid was being made for assistance but there was no way to reach them from St. Louis or East St. Louis, the only place that can now render aid.

City Atty. Robert Hargner of Venice, is reported by his relatives to be missing and they fear he perished when the city was overwhelmed. Deputy County William Hainhorn of Madison county and his son, who lived in Venice have been given up as lost. William Anchor and Mrs. Clifton and her infant have been missing for several days and it is thought they floated home.

In one party of refugees near Edwardsville, four cases of smallpox developed yesterday. The officials of Madison county are doing all in their power to isolate the cases and prevent a spread of the disease.

Numerous families, penniless and having no friends to whom to go, refuse to leave their flooded homes. In many cases these people are actually starving and food will be furnished them by men in skiffs at once.

MIDWAY ISLAND STATION.

U. S. Tug Iroquois for it to Assist Cable Ship.

Honolulu, June 2.—(Special Correspondence of the Associated Press.)—The United States tug Iroquois left on May 28 for Midway island, which will assist the cable ship. In any way possible and Capt. Pond, who goes on board with Capt. Rodman, commandant of the vessel, will report on a site for a light house. It is expected that the island will be used as a calling place by vessels when it is in cable communication with the world. Capt. Pond will also make a report on plans for fortifying the island, it is stated.

Collector Chamberlain of the internal revenue office, has received orders to send to Washington all the records of his office in connection with the registration of Chinese. About 20,000 Chinese were given certificates of registration by Chamberlain and duplicates were sent to the English department in Washington. There are nearly 200 which were never called for and the local Chinese consul is publishing a list, in the hope of having the owners called for them before the documents are sent away.

HARVARD SCHOLARSHIP.

John K. Bonnell of Stanford Gets It This Year.

Stanford University, Cal., June 9.—The graduate scholarship at Harvard University, given each year by the Harvard club of San Francisco, has just been awarded to John K. Bonnell, of Stanford, who recently received his diploma from the English department with the class of 1903. The appointment will enable him to continue at the eastern institution the literary and artistic work which has made him well known here. The scholarship has been worked to open to students of both Stanford and the University of California.

It has been given annually by the Harvard club for the past 15 years, but has been more frequently allotted to graduates of the state university. Bonnell came to Palo Alto in 1895 from Philadelphia.

Chicago Laundry Trouble.

Chicago, June 9.—At a meeting of the Laundry Workers' union last night it was voted to reconsider the agreement made by the union in reference to open shops, the vote standing 257 to 170. The agreement in question was signed last Saturday night, and terminated the long laundry strike.

The action taken last night was the forerunner of a vote that will be taken at a special meeting to be held when the "open shop" proposition will be submitted to a final vote.

Much dissatisfaction was expressed at the meeting over the "open shop" agreement, which it was said would ultimately result in the weeding out of all union employees.

An Irish Meeting Suppressed.

Dublin, June 9.—An Irish National league meeting announced to take place at Ballo, Waterford, Sunday, was suppressed by the police. The members of the league, however, assembled in a field outside of town, at which the proposal of the corporation of Waterford to present an address to King Edward on the occasion of the king's proposed visit to Ireland, was denounced.

To Convert Italian Rentes.

Rome, June 9.—The minister of the treasury has presented to the chamber of deputies a bill to convert the 4 1/2 per cent Italian rents into 3 1/2 per cent. The minister, moreover, asks authority to eventually convert the 5 and 4 per cent into 3 1/2 per cent, subject to requiring to apply again to parliament.

Police Measuring Machine Defective.

New York, June 9.—An investigation has been started by the civil service board and Commissioner of Police Greene, into a charge first made that the machine, which has been used at headquarters for years for measuring applicants for the force, is defective.

If the machine is as far wrong as alleged, there may be found to be many policemen on the force too short for their jobs. According to an official inspection of the machine, it appears that the apparatus can be so manipulated that a man being measured can add half an inch to his height, which necessarily makes him five feet seven and a half inches. It is asserted that a scheme has been found possible whereby the electric mechanism showing that the person being measured is

standing squarely on his heels can be manipulated by the pressure from one heel, enabling the applicant to raise himself a trifle beyond his true height.

George O'Brien Arrested.

Kalispell, Mont., June 8.—George O'Brien, who killed John Flynn at Rexford, on June 1, has been arrested at Tobacco Plains and arrived here today in custody of Deputy Sheriff George Rich. With him was arrested John O'Neill, known as Dempsey, who is wanted at Fernie, B. C., for murder. The men were in a railroad grading camp when caught. O'Brien killed Flynn for the money in the till of his store and saloon.

Scientists Going to Alaska.

Seattle, Wash., June 8.—Frederick A. Cook, a scientist of New York; Robert A. Dunn, a young geologist of Harvard, and Ralph Shainwald, a young biologist graduate of Columbia, forming the Cook expedition en route to Alaska, to make an ascent to the summit of Mount McKinley, the highest peak on the American continent, arrived in Seattle. The party has secured 15 pack horses which will be taken to Cook's Inlet tomorrow.

Included in the 1,200 pounds of food supplies will be special preparations for use while on the ascent. The equipment consists of alpine axes, glacial ropes, alcohol and petroleum stoves, a silk tent weighing less than three pounds, capable of accommodating the party, sleeping bags, which may be used as overcoats, cameras, etc.

Should the summit be reached, as every confidence is expressed by each of the party, the atmospheric conditions will be first observed.

He Will be Allowed an Additional Mounted Letter Carrier.

(Special to the "News.") Washington, D. C., June 8.—Albert J. Casey has been appointed letter carrier and Robert Kirkpatrick substitute, Moscow, Idaho. Assistant Supt. of Free Delivery Service Edin has made a report to the postmaster-general recommending that one additional mounted letter carrier be allowed Postmaster Thomas on July 1 with allowance of \$300 for horse hire and two additional carriers to be allowed on Oct. 1 and November 1. The postmaster at Edin, W. Mendenhall, Dillon and Marquette, Wyoming, will become domestic mail order offices on July 1.
