Ernest Holmes has resigned as money order clerk at the post office, and E. Pritchard takes his place.

The harvesting machinery dealers report that there is an excellent demand for threshing machinery and stoves, also for sleds as up in the country there is now considerable snow.

D. H. Spencer, an old citizen of Corinne, is dead at Chicago of apoplexy, at the age of 78. He was a native of Washington county, N. Y., and leaves a wife, four sons and a daughter.

George Davis, a member of the Salt Lake union of the Hotel and Restaurant Employees International Alliance and the Bar Tenders International league, died suddenly on the train yesterday east of Evanston.
