SECOND ATTEMPT HIS SUCCESSFUL.

Samuel T. Briley, Ex-Saloonman, Finally Succeeds in Taking His Own Life.

MORPHINE ENDED HIS CAREER.

Cause of His Rash Act Was Insan Jealousy Over a Woman of Ill Repute.

Samuel T. Briley, recently one of the proprietors of the Golden Gate saloon on Second South street, has at last succeeded in committing suicide by taking morphine. Shortly after 6 o'clock last evening he was found in a rooming house over the saloon in a dying condition, and Drs. Gleason and Gibson were summoned to his assistance, but their efforts to save him were unavailing, and about an hour later Briley passed away. The young man engaged a room at the place Sunday night and did not need them. Good-bye, Franklin, said to the woman named "Morphine," who lives at Madge Daniels' resort on Commercial street. About six weeks ago Briley had a row with the woman and took a large dose of morphine. Dr. J. S. Wither was summoned, and after working over the man for several hours, managed to save him. Briley then sold his interest in the Golden Gate saloon and disappeared. He was not seen again until he was found at his relatives at Bonifant or Centerville. A few days ago he returned. Sunday he borrowed 50 cents from Frank Bruce, a bartender at the State and Second Bruce received the following note from Briley:

"November 29, '03. "Frank—You can have that suit of underclothes that I bought yesterday. I don't need them. Good-bye, Franklin. Tell Morrie good-bye for me. Think kindly of me once in a while. SAM. "You pay the messenger, as I have nothing left now."

FOUND BY ACCIDENT. Briley's friends naturally concluded that he had decided to kill himself and a search for him was instituted but he could not be found. He was traced to the Farior Drug store in State and Second South street, but no further information concerning him could be obtained until he was found last evening, quite by accident, in the Butte lodging house. On the dresser in his room was found a note addressed: "To Whom It May Concern," but what he had written could not be made out.

The rooms were removed to Evans-undertaking parlors. No inquest will be held.

DESERTED HIS WIFE. Several months ago Briley married a young woman at Park City but deserted her for a woman in Madge Daniels' resort. He was infatuated with her, but the couple quarreled frequently and Briley threatened several times to kill her.

The body will be held at Evans' undertaking parlors. No inquest will be held.
