

LYNCH MUST PAY DEATH PENALTY.

Man Who Saved Guard Jacob's Life to Die at Hands of Executioners

"ROY" KAIGHN OUT ON PAROLE

Duke, However, Was Denied a Pardon by the Board on Saturday—Other Applications Considered.

Unless something unforeseen happens to prevent it, there will be another execution at the state prison on Friday, Jan. 8, 1904, when James Lynch will pay the death penalty for the murder of Colonel Geoffrey Prowse, at the Sheep Ranch club in this city over three years ago.

Letters and petitions in favor of commutation signed by 10 of the 12 jurors who convicted Lynch, also Mayor Thompson, Sheriff Emery, a number of city councilmen and others, were read by the attorney, Guard Zebulon Jacobs, who was seriously injured during the prison break, made affidavit to the effect that Lynch prevented the other prisoners from carrying out their threat to kill Jacobs outright at that time.

Lynch, when informed of the action of the board, was very dependent as he fully expected a commutation of sentence. Lynch said that he supposed it was all up with him now. He was taken from his cell in murderers' row soon after the action of the board, and taken to a cell on the first floor of the south cell house near the cell occupied by Peter Mortensen before his execution. A death watch was immediately established and a guard will be with him constantly until the date of the execution.

ROY KAIGHN PAROLED.

The board of pardons granted a parole to "Roy" Kaighn, who was serving five years for the killing of William S. Haynes in the corridor of the Knutsford hotel on Nov. 26, 1901. The parole was granted upon condition that the boy be furnished employment. Col. M. M. Kaighn stated that he would give his son employment in his law office. A parole was accordingly granted instead of a pardon and Col. Kaighn went out with the prison and brought his son home with him.

DUKE TURNED DOWN.

The application for pardon of Harry T. Duke was denied by the board. Duke is serving a term of four years for embezzling funds of Wells Fargo's bank in this city. Other applications considered by the board are as follows: Edward Redmond, four years, robbery, parole granted; D. C. Carroll, four years, assault with intent to do bodily harm, parole granted; L. Napier, one year, obtaining money under false pretenses, pardon granted; Thomas Ames, burglary, pardon denied; James Edwards, Dalton, three years, assault with intent to commit rape, pardon denied; Henry Wright, nine years, grand larceny and burglary, parole denied; Harry Poole, robbery, and Peter P. Mickel, larceny, both continued.

NEW RESERVOIR SCHEME.

Millard County Project Will Redeem a Large Area of Arid Land.

George A. Seaman of the presidency of the Millard stake is up from Abraham, one of Millard's most promising young settlements. He reports conditions in that section all that could be desired and says that work on the new reservoir scheme is being pushed with all possible vigor, and that the prospects for state aid in its accomplishment are most encouraging. The scheme is to divert water from the Sevier river sufficient to irrigate more abundantly the land now under cultivation, and to reclaim from 2,000 to 100,000 acres now arid. The proposed reservoir will cost \$8,000, but when completed will be of incalculable value to that section. The present reservoir has a capacity of 20,000 acre feet, and while its achievements are much appreciated, the larger one will open up the country, and make it habitable for thousands of homeseekers. Mr. Seaman is most enthusiastic over the outlook and in this he is ably seconded by C. H. Wilken, one of the founders of that settlement.

CHINESE COOK WAS SHOT DEAD.

Alta-Quincy Boarding House the Scene of a Bloody Tragedy On Saturday.

J. H. WADE DID THE SHOOTING.

He Was Arrested and Now in Jail Awaiting a Preliminary Hearing Tomorrow Morning.

The boardinghouse at the Alta-Quincy mine at Alta was the scene of a tragedy on Saturday afternoon about 2 o'clock in which Lee Yoo, a Chinese cook, was shot and killed by J. H. Wade, a young miner about 27 years of age. From the facts obtained it seems that the cook and Rudolph Olsen, another miner, became engaged in a quarrel over some water during the midday meal and the Mongolian made a rush at Olsen with a huge knife. Supt. Colbath interfered and stopped the fight.

Atten left, it is said that the cook again started after Olsen with the knife. At this point Mr. Wade intervened and the Chinaman then turned upon him and attempted to strike him up. Wade then drew his revolver and shot the infuriated cook. The bullet, which was of .38 caliber, entered the head near the left eye and plowed clear through the skull. The Chinaman was not quite dead so a start was made with him for medical assistance but he expired on the road.

PROVED AN ALIBI.

Evidence Was Not Sufficient to Convict Alleged Holdup.

The jury in the case of the state vs John C. Burns, charged with robbery, today returned a verdict of not guilty, upon the instructions of Judge Morse to that effect. At the conclusion of the testimony Dist. Atty. Elchorn stated that the evidence was insufficient, and that he would give defendant the benefit of the doubt and acquit him. Thereupon Judge Morse instructed the jury to return a verdict of not guilty. Burns was tried for being implicated in the Cottonation saloon holdup but proved an alibi.

MINISTERS RESOLVE.

Alleged Extract from Elder Woodruff's Sermon to be Sent East.

At today's meeting of the Ministerial association a resolution was adopted relative to Elder A. O. Woodruff's recent address in the Tabernacle; and after quoting an alleged extract from the same the resolution was made to read: "In order that the people of the East may understand what Christian men and women have to put up with in Utah while standing up for the American flag, and for Christian truth and righteousness, resolved, by the Salt Lake Ministerial association that a copy of the paper containing the above extract from Apostle Woodruff's speech, in the Tabernacle on Sunday, Dec. 13, 1903, be sent to each United States senator, and to the different denominational papers.

Motion for Non-Suit Overruled.

Judge Stewart this morning overruled defendant's motion for a non-suit in the damage case of John W. Meyer against the Highland Boy Gold Mining company and the taking of testimony in behalf of defendant was then proceeded with.

IDAHO SUGAR BOUNTY.

Case Involving Its Constitutionality Continued Till Jan. 4.

(Special to the "News.") Boise, Ida., Dec. 21.—The application for a writ of prohibition restraining the state officials from issuing any more bonds under authority of the seventh session of the legislature, which was before the official canvass, the official court today, was continued until Jan. 4 because the attorneys were not prepared to present their case. The action involves the constitutionality of a bounty to sugar factories, among other matters.

STILL AT WORK ON BALLOTS.

There were only three changes made in the election returns in the count of the ballots in districts 17 and 18 in Judge Lewis' court this morning. In district 17, Wood gained one vote and the others remained the same as reported in the official canvass. The official vote of the district resulting from the count made in court is as follows: Wood, 55; Dean, 75; Burbridge, 194; Badger, 193, and the two Socialist candidates nine each.
