WEATHER REPORT.

Record at the local office of the weather bureau for the 24 hours ending at 6 a. m. today:

Barometer reading at 6 a. m., 29.94 inches; temperature at 4 a. m., 19 degrees; maximum, 24; minimum, 17; mean, 20; which is 4 degrees below normal.

Deficiency of daily mean temperature since Jan. 1, 3.24 degrees.

Precipitation since the first of the month, .23 inch, which is .96 inch below the normal.

Deficiency in precipitation since Jan. 1, 1.28 inch.

Local forecast for Salt Lake City and vicinity: Fair tonight and Wednesday.

WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer is highest over the middle and northern plains, and lowest over the south Pacific coast and lake region.

Precipitation occurred over portions of Illinois, Minnesota, Louisiana and British Columbia. It was raining this morning at Chicago.

The temperature changes were slight and unimportant except a rise of 11 to 20 degrees over portions of Colorado, Nebraska and Alberta; and a fall of 14 to 23 degrees over portions of Kansas, Nebraska, North and South Dakota, Minnesota and Manitoba.

TO ORGANIZED LABOR OF UTAH. "The Mormon Church has commenced a fight to annihilate union labor in Utah. Yesterday in the Tabernacle President Angus M. Cannon called upon Bishops to assist in getting men to take the places of strikers in Carbon county. This action has been approved by the governor, which is only one indication of the co-operation of the administration in this matter."

He contracted a slight cold a few days ago and paid but little attention to it. Yesterday morning he was seized with a fit of coughing which continued for some time.
