COREA AND ITS QUEER PEOPLE.

Something of the Hermit Kingdom Where Centers the Russo-Japanese Dispute.

SEOUL, SEAT OF EXCITEMENT.

"Grafting" One Adjunct of Civilization Which Appears to be Indigenously in Corea.

Seoul, Corea, Jan. 17.—The seat of excitement in the far east seems now to be Seoul rather than Tokyo or Port Arthur. As the probable meeting ground of the land forces of Japan and Russia in the event of war Corea has been attracting attention for some time.

So far no overt act of hostility toward foreigners has been committed, and the proverbial meekness of the Coreans indicates that the talk of a popular rising is nothing but talk. Still, Minister Allen doesn't believe in taking chances.

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AMERICAN CONSULS TO THE NEWLY OPENED MANCHURIAN PORTS.

It is announced on semi-official authority that Russia will not permit the consuls of the United States or of any other country to enter those points, inasmuch as China has no right to dispose of any privileges in Manchuria.


