Warren Stanton of 523 Third East street was president of the late Walter Williams' funeral. He fell from a scaffold to the ground yesterday afternoon, at 340 east Fifth South street. He fell 21 feet, but escaped with bad bruises.

Joseph Berlin, Formerly of Huntsville, Utah, Wanted at La Plata And Other Places.

HAS LED A CHECKERED CAREER.

Now in Custody at Bluff, San Juan County, Where He Was Taken In by Frank Hyde.

Moab, Utah, via Thompson, Aug. 26.—Word has just reached here that Joseph Berlin was arrested by Frank Hyde at Bluff yesterday. Berlin is wanted at La Plata, Colo., for stealing two horses from Higginson & Hite. He is also wanted at Monticello, Utah, for selling the two stolen horses to parties in San Juan county and stealing a horse from J. M. Cunningham & Co. of Adams of Bluff. There is a warrant in the sheriff's office at this place for his arrest, which Sheriff Taylor has made two unsuccessful attempts to serve. This warrant charges Berlin with stealing a horse from Chas. Williams of Moab.

Berlin came to Moab from Huntsville, Utah, in 1898, and lived here until a year ago, when he appropriated one hundred and forty dollars from some Mexicans and left for Colorado. Up to that time he was considered one of the promising young men of the town. In the last year, however, he has been a lawless and office business at horse stealing. Hyde is not an officer of any kind and appears to have simply arrested the man on general principles.

WILL BE ELIMINATED.

Grade School Work No Longer Part of High School Schedule.

The grade school work will be entirely eliminated from the Bryant or East Side high school and only high school work will be conducted. Such a conclusion was reached at the meeting of the committee on teachers and school work of the board of education, held in the office of O. W. Moyle yesterday afternoon. Since the establishment of high school work in the Bryant school there has also been senior eighth grade work done there. The committee has decided to eliminate the eighth grade work and substitute another year of the regular high school course corresponding to the second year work done in the West Side high school. The action of the committee will be subject to approval at the next meeting of the board of education.

It was also decided to recommend the employment of two new high school teachers, Austin P. Lorrabel of Harvard university, teacher of biology, and Miss Mae Jones, a graduate of the Salt Lake high school and of Oberlin college, teacher of English.

The committee also decided to purchase a new piano for the Lafayette school.

FRUIT DEALERS WARNED

Are Cautioned Against Fruits Infested With San Jose Scale.

The following letter, addressed to fruit importers and dealers throughout the state, has just been issued by Joseph H. Parry, secretary of the state board of horticulture:

As this state is menaced by the importation and spread of San Jose scale and other pests and diseases injurious to fruit trees, vines and plants, fruit importers and dealers and transportation companies are warned against receiving or handling fruit from orchards that they know or have reason to believe are infested with San Jose scale, whether the fruit be grown in Utah or imported from other states.

Any fruit found to be infested with the San Jose scale or any other pests or diseases injurious to fruit trees, vines or plants, is liable to condemnation as a nuisance and will be treated as such at the cost of the owner and destroyed.

The state horticultural law enjoins upon the county boards of horticulture and the duty of safeguarding the fruit interests of this state by keeping a close inspection of fruit packing houses, stores and salesrooms, to see that no pernicious insects or diseases are imported or spread abroad in the state.

To aid in the work of keeping under control injurious insects and diseases of fruit, importers or dealers who have reason to suspect the presence of such in any fruit or packages sent them, should have the same examined by some member of their county board of horticulture, or fruit tree inspectors before disposing of the fruit in any manner.
