Tooele City, Tooele Co., Nov. 9.—In
the death of John Taylor, who has
lived in Tooele county since 1854, he
passed from our midst one of our oldest
and most faithful citizens. Deceased was
born in Colchester, Warwickshire, Eng-
land, April 9, 1822; joined the Church in
his native town when a very young
man, and emigrated to Utah in 1854. He
lived in Tooele a short time when he
moved to Cache valley with his family,
but came back to Tooele again in 1861,
where he has been a constant resident
ever since. He has endured all the
hardships and privations incident to
pioneer days, has remained true and
faithful to every principle of the Gospel,
and has gone to a well earned rest. He
was a member of the High Priests'
quorum. His wife and three sons and
five daughters survive him.
