which has been in session in Washington, has been attended by many women prominent in educational and philanthropic movements. Mrs. Mary Wood Swift of California, president of the council, presided over the sessions, and most of the other officers were present. The full list of officers is as follows: Vice president at large, Mrs. Kate Waller Barrett, Virginia; corresponding secretary, Mrs. Flo Miller Jamison, Illinois; recording secretary, Mrs. Isabelle Quinlan, Illinois; and Mrs. Frances R. Burns, Michigan; treasurer, Mrs. Lillian M. Hollister, Michigan. Miss Susan B. Anthony was in attendance during the week, as well as these well-known women: Miss Sadie American, Mrs. Hannah G. Solomon, Miss Anna Shaw, Mrs. Mary Church Terrell, Mrs. Debra Lee Wood, and Mrs. May Wright Sewall. Mrs. Anthony, on several occasions, met with a splendid reception at the morning session on Tuesday. It was unanimously decided that Miss Anthony was due the organization of the council, and she was officially designated its founder. During the week the council discussed almost every vital question, and a few not quite vital, which have been mentioned of late years. Race suicide, child labor, marriage and divorce, Mormonism, international peace, woman suffrage, the social evil, temperance, and a few more. Mormonism has been discussed before by the council, and at its last meeting a resolution against Mormons in Congress was presented, only to be defeated through the efforts of Mormon women members, among whom are Mrs. Emeline Wells and Mrs. Lorenzo Snow, both plural wives, and Mrs. Susan Young Gates, a daughter of Brigham Young. Mrs. Gates is not a plural wife, but she is an ardent "Mormon." This time no "Mormon" women attended the council, and a resolution was passed strongly opposing "the sealing or holding of a seat in our national Congress by any man who may practice or subscribe to polygamy."

Patric Mackham spoke on labor conditions and he renewed read his poem, "The Man With the Hoe" and other of his poems. Miss Sadie American told of the immense growth of the National Council of Jewish Women, which organization has increased in 10 years from 1,500 to 5,000 members.
