LOCAL BRIEFS.

Secretary of State C. S. Tingy went to Nephi today in the interest of the state attorney board to select a new hall for the guards at that place. Local No. 83, Brotherhood of Railroad Carmen of America, will give its fifth annual ball tomorrow night, in Scandinavian hall on south main street. Rev. W. T. Fish, Jr., formerly pastor of the Unitarian society in this city, has been called to the Meadville, Pa., Unitarian church, and he has accepted. State Auditor Edwards, ex officio dealer of weights and measures, in the city of Salt Lake, is expected to be returned from Ogden to Los Angeles. The postoffice department notifies Senator Sutherland that there is no foundation to the report that railway mail headquarters are to be transferred from Ogden to Los Angeles. Tomorrow Clerk Judd of the board of education will lay the salaries of the principals and teachers of the city schools for the eighth month of school ending May 15. The total amount of the payroll is \$26,972.27. The citizens' ways and means committee in aid of the gymnasium fund, met yesterday afternoon, and selected May 20 as the date for the Tabernacle musicale for which Prof. Stephens is preparing an attractive program. The 'marriage' of the Union Pacific and Central Pacific roads occurred 35 years ago yesterday, up on Fremont street, which is lost on a sliding now that the Lucin cut-off has been completed. The event was joyfully celebrated in the Salt Lake theater. Articles of incorporation of the Palace Bowling Alley club of this city have been filed in the county clerk's office. The incorporators of the club are A. S. Zimmerman, A. G. Crabbe, O. C. Hatch, H. E. Evans, and George W. Wright. Its capital stock is \$10,000. The friends of L. D. (Rens) Young of the Salt Lake Hardware force will regret to learn that he is lying at his home critically ill as a result of a hemorrhage of the stomach. He is under careful medical attention, but his condition is undoubtedly serious. On Wednesday, May 17, a Norwegian association of this city will celebrate the Norwegian independence day at the Salt Palace. An extensive program has been prepared for the afternoon, to be given in the Salt Palace theater and in the evening a ball will be given in the dance pavilion. State Food Inspector Peterson wishes it understood that neither himself nor any connected with his office was responsible for the condemnation of certain consignments of strawberries a day or two ago on Market row. It is but just to say in this connection that to J. J. Meyer, city food inspector, belongs the credit of preventing the sale of the undesirable fruit. Prof. Rubin Goldmark has removed from the Knutsford hotel to the University club. It will be noted with interest, in connection with his visit here, that last winter, Mr. Savage of the well known opera company, had the professor travel abroad of the company and give public lectures on the 'City of the Angels' subject. This so attracted public attention that the attendance on the following performances was very gratifying to the management of the opera company. R. F. Moore, the Collier Publishing company collector, who was so badly slashed with a knife the other day on a Wood River, train, by a crazy sheepherder, is dead, and the body will be shipped to the home of his father, Dr. James Moore, in Ontario, Canada. Young Moore was attempting to aid the deputy sheriff, who had a lunatic in charge, when the latter managed to get in his work and then jump the train. The officer promptly shot and killed the lunatic. The method of causing anaesthesia by means of injecting cocaine into the spinal cord was thoroughly explained at the Groves L. D. S. hospital yesterday by Dr. Morton of San Francisco. In the presence of 30 or more members of the local medical fraternity, a patient was operated upon on the leg and arm, after the drug had been injected by the doctor. Those present seem to appreciate the efficacy of the mode prescribed. GAMBLING DENN CLOSED. Sheriff's Office Does Good Work at Bingham Junction. Acting under instructions from the county attorney, all the gambling houses at Bingham Junction were closed down by Deputy Sheriff Heckstead last night, and will be kept closed with a view to running that class of citizens out of the town. The gambling dens just opened up there in the last few days and before the officials realized it, several of them were operating in full swing. At the meeting of the city council of Murray on Tuesday night the question of advancing the city from the third class to one of the second class was discussed and a mass meeting of citizens has been called for the night of May 15 to get the views of the people on the matter. The meeting will be held in the schoolhouse at Murray. There are now a number of petitions before the council from the residents of outlying districts asking to be annexed to the city of Murray and it is thought with the annexation of those districts the necessary population can be secured to advance the town to a city of the second class. It is felt that the advance in grade would give the citizens better school facilities and the annexation of the proposed districts would equalize the school taxes.

SALT LAKE READERS. Library Report Shows Over 9,000 Books Loaned for the Month. At the meeting of the board of directors of the free public library Tuesday afternoon the librarian, Miss Sprague, submitted her report for the month of April. It shows the total number of volumes in the library on May 1 to be 25,562, an increase of 131 during the past month. The total membership at the close of the month was 14,756, an increase for the month of 112 members. There were 9,328 books loaned for home use, an average of 359 per day. The number of books issued for use in the reading rooms was 2,264, an average of 140 per day. The daily number of visitors at the library is estimated at 729. The receipts for fines and forfeitures amounted to \$65.21 for the entire month. Following is the classified circulation of the library:
