

# SWEDEN AND NORWAY MAY CRY QUILTS

King's Veto of the Separate Consular Law Created a Great Sensation

## A DISSOLUTION OF THE UNION.

It is Possible and International Complications May Perhaps Follow.

Christiania, May 28.—King Oscar's veto of the separate consular law created a great sensation as possibly involving a dissolution of the union between Sweden and Norway and perhaps even international complications may arise through the information which the king has given that there is any danger of a Russian invasion, contending that if Russia had designs, which they do not believe she would not be bettered in pressing them by having to fight both Sweden and Norway, and that therefore the question of a dissolution of the union will have no effect from an international aspect.

The king's decision was given in the Norwegian council sitting at Stockholm. Each member of the cabinet individually urged the king to sanction the consular law. When they all had spoken, King Oscar read a declaration in which he declared that the crown prince on April 3, that the matter was solvable only by mutual negotiations. He added that he could not give his consent to the law because the existing consular service could not be abolished without mutual agreement. The existing arrangement, he said, was established by a resolution of the mixed council and his love for both peoples impelled him to withhold his sanction.

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was not only the rejection of a pressing demand by the whole of the Norwegian people, but drawn up as it was in disregard of the cabinet's unanimous advice and against the advice of King Oscar. It was a breach of the constitutional rights, independence and sovereignty of Norway and would mean a dissolution of the union. No member of the Norwegian government, he said, could counteract such a decision without that moment losing his fatherland.

The members of the cabinet having presented their resignations, King Oscar read his reply, declaring that he could not accept them as it was clear that no other cabinet could be formed at the present time. The ministers, however, declined to withdraw their resignations. They had beforehand appealed to the king to defer action on the matter until it could be dealt with in the full council at Christiania, but the king had announced his inability to acquiesce. No further action on the proceedings was down up as the ministers all refused to counteract one, and the king's veto of the law therefore is constitutionally non-existent.

## AMERICAN STEEL RAILS CHEAPER ABROAD THAN AT HOME

Washington, May 28.—In view of the published policy of the Isthmian canal commission to buy in the cheapest market there have been a great many inquiries as to the price of steel rails, one of the principal articles of supply which figured in the commission's decision. Col. Edwards, administrative officer of the canal commission, addressed an inquiry to Secy. Drake of the Panama Railroad company, intended to elicit information on this point. He received a reply which in substance is that the price for steel rails in the United States for the last 12 months has been uniform at \$28 per ton, while in foreign markets the price was \$24 per ton. The exceptions were where rails were sold in the United States for export, when the prices were established by direct negotiations and were matters of private record. The Panama Railroad company convinced the manufacturers that its rails were purchased for export to foreign territory (which Mr. Drake says Colon is), and was able to get in June last 70-pound rails for \$22.75 per ton, and in August second quality rails for \$22.50 per ton. Last January it bought 1,200 tons at \$20 for first class and \$24 for second class, and more recently purchased 2,500 tons for the canal commission at \$25.50 for the railroad at \$28.45, all three contracts being made in competition with foreign manufacturers, whose list price was \$28 c. o. b. at New York, or \$27.25 c. l. f. at Colon, exclusive of wharf and port charges.

## Four New Openings in Vesuvius.

Naples, May 28.—The eruption of Mount Vesuvius continues, the volcano showing four new openings through which lava flows, while the immediate surrounding country is covered with ashes. The funicular railroad has been compelled to cease running.

## Religious Revival in New York.

New York, May 28.—The first of the great mass meetings planned by ministers now working to inaugurate a religious revival in this city has been held in the academy of music. The big theater was about two-thirds filled. Unique methods were used to gather a crowd. A dozen automobiles, ten of them furnished by a woman deeply interested in the revival movement, invaded the main thoroughfares and streets in the vicinity. Reinforced by music, speakers in the automobiles told of the meeting and besought all to attend.

## Society of Friends.

New York, May 28.—The religious society of Friends is holding its 123rd year meeting at the Maxon House, the Hundred and Fifteenth street and Rutherford place. Friends from many nearby places and far away cities are in attendance, only a few of the older ones wearing the picturesque, simple dress of the old-time Quakers. Sunday was devoted to worship, there being five gatherings during the day.



## CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS.

Several Good Positions Under Government to Competition June 21. There will be civil service examinations in this city June 21, for the position of assistant, office of seed and plant introduction, department of agriculture, salary \$1,800; also, for position of lead burner, United States mint service, at Denver, at \$4.25 per day, and for those positions in the United States mint and assay service at Denver: Three engineers, \$5.50 to \$4.25 per day; seven firemen, \$3.90 per annum; two electricians, \$3.50 to \$4.25 per day; one adjuster of scales, \$4.25 per day; four assistants assay department, \$1.50 to \$3 per day. July 15, for the position of editorial and statistical assistant, bureau of the census, \$900 to \$1,200, per annum.

# AUSTRO-HUNGARIAN POLITICAL SITUATION

It Has Become Really Serious, Reaching an Acute Stage That Is Threatening

## CROWN IS VERY AGGRESSIVE.

Affairs Have Not Been So Bad Since 1867—A Revolution Is Not Impossible.

Vienna, May 28.—The political situation in Hungary has passed within the last few days from the passive stage of recent months into a comparatively acute stage that is threatening really serious consequences. Count Tisza, it is said, will be removed from the premiership next week and in his stead will be appointed, if he can form a cabinet, Gen. Baron Fejervary, formerly Hungarian minister of national defense, which office he has to resign because of great unpopularity arising from his extreme partnership to the crown in matters within his jurisdiction.

The rights guaranteed Hungarians under their constitution, leaders of that country say, are upon the eve of being threatened by the crown's action, and the Hungarians are preparing to contest these infringements in a manner which holds the possibility of bringing serious results to the mutual life of the dual monarchy.

The possibilities with which the political situation is pregnant, may lead to a state of affairs meaning practically a revolution, especially as Baron Fejervary is thought to be a man who will carry out the crown's wishes irrespective of Hungarian public opinion. The situation has not been so threatening as it is today since peace was established between Austria and Hungary in 1867.

The struggle in Hungary today can fairly be called in its broader outlines an energetic affirmation of popular rights against the undue prevalence of the royal prerogative. In the development of his rights guaranteed by the constitution which the king is sworn to respect and which dates back a thousand years, consecrated by the blood of countless thousands of Hungarians, the country is thoroughly aroused with a view to protecting its most sacred institution against army assault. Fejervary's ministry would be colorless and neutral and, composed of members of the minority, would be unconstitutional, unlawful and unparliamentary and be sharply attacked by the opposition.

The Hungarians are in no spirit to accept such procedure. Among the measures which the Hungarians declare they will employ in defense of their constitutional rights are the refusal to pay taxes, which cannot be legally collected, before the house of deputies; the refusal to grant recruits and the refusal of Hungary of its pro-rata contribution to the expenses of the dual monarchy.
