HOW HUMUS BENEFITS THE SOIL.

In several ways humus benefits the soil. The most striking benefit is in its improving the texture. Mix a little leaf mold, gathered from the woods, with a handful of light, sandy soil. Does it not give the soil more body and make it less sticky...

Another benefit that humus confers upon a soil is that of increasing its water-holding capacity. A soil of light texture, without humus, is like a sponge that has been squeezed out of water...
