LOCAL BRIEFS.

The postoffice is enjoying a half holiday today, on account of the state fair, and carriers are not making afternoon deliveries.

This is Green's day at the Pure food show, and tomorrow it will be Telephone City's day. The show continues to draw large crowds, and is a gratifying success.

An attempt is being made in the First Congregational church to compel women worshippers to remove their hats, so that "the man behind" can see, and incidentally hear.

A copy of the articles of incorporation of the Rockwell Town Drain company of Washington county have been filed in the secretary of state's office. Its capital stock is \$6,000.

Registration supplies are being sent out to the registrars of the county by County Clerk Eldredge and his deputies. The days for registration for the election on Nov. 1 next are the 17th and 21st of October.

The county commissioners have confirmed the appointment of the following special deputy sheriffs to act without pay from the county during the duck season: John A. Winegar, James D. Hardy, Solomon Young and W. A. Hamilton.

The high school seniors passed resolutions yesterday afternoon, over the death of Miss Ida Robinson, and appointed six pallbearers, viz: Francis C. Henshaw, Julian Bamberger, George Roberts, Frank King, Scott Lynn and Leigh Nettleton. The interment at Mount Olivet will be private.

Judge George O. Armstrong and wife and the latter's mother, Mrs. Eckhart, will leave this evening to accompany the remains of Mr. Eckhart to Oskaloosa, Iowa, for interment. Mr. Eckhart died about 10 days ago and his remains are to be buried in the family burial plot at his former home.

George Myer, an actor who has been appearing at the Fair, was arrested today by Sergeant Hempel. It is believed that Myer robbed a man named George Lemmon of \$40, although no definite information has been obtained by the police. Myer is booked on the charge of using obscene language, but may be prosecuted on the charge of robbery.

Word has been received by Mayor Morris that the protest entered by him in behalf of Salt Lake City against certain bluffs on reservoir sites in Big and Little Cottonwood canyons within the Salt Lake forest reserve, has been received by the interior department at Washington and turned over to the proper departments for consideration.

U. S. Marshal Heywood has orders from Washington to move his office and those of the federal court and district attorney into the new federal building, as soon as possible. The building will receive bids for the removal of the three offices, the bids to be forwarded to Washington. It is not believed that the removal can be effected before the middle of the month.

Willard Thompson was yesterday given a preliminary hearing before Justice Dana T. Smith, for assault, alleged to have been committed near Murray on Aug. 23. He was found guilty and bound over to the district court on a bond of \$2,500. The case came to Justice Smith on a change of venue from the justice's court at Bingham Junction. Thomson made a hard fight to secure his release.

Manager L. L. Lunn of the Telluride Power company filed application yesterday afternoon with the state engineer for 80 second feet of water from the Duchesne river in Wasatch county, for power purposes. He proposes to erect a power plant to furnish light and power for Park City, Salt Lake, Brigham, Mercur, Eureka, Frisco and other localities. The water will be diverted through a 40,700 ft. canal, and operate three Pelton wheels which will furnish 7,500 horse power.

White Shockley was being tried the second time, Chaplain John T. Austin of the Eighteenth infantry at Fort Leavenworth, Kans., found a former chain of Shockley's in the guardhouse who had a mixture of the murderer tattooed on his arm. The chaplain is positive that the man is the same as the one who shot at him at the Philippines, where he made a great record for bravery.

MORE SIDEWALKS ARE PROVIDED FOR

Council Passes Ordinance for Much New Paving for City Streets.

DAVID KEITH MADE PROTEST

Mayor Morris Vetoes Resolution Ordering Connection of Water Mains - Sewer Pump Site Purchased.

Last night was routine night at the city council meeting, and there was little business of public interest transacted aside from the passage of the sidewalk ordinance. Every member of the council was present and a great deal of work was done. The most important ordinance taken up was one providing for the construction of cement sidewalks in a large district in the southeastern part of the city. The rules were suspended and the ordinance was read the first, second and third time and passed by a unanimous vote.

THE ORDINANCE.

The ordinance levies a tax and provides for the assessment of property abutting on both sides of all wide streets from East Temple street to Ninth East street, both streets inclusive, and from Fourth South street to Ninth South street, both streets inclusive, on State street from Ninth South street to Tenth South street, and on streets around block 5, plat "A," and all narrow streets in said district, in sidewalk districts Nos. 9, 15, 20, 22, 29 and 46, for the construction of cement sidewalks.

KEITH MAKES PROTEST.

David Keith petitioned the council to have all of block 25, plat A, excluded from the sidewalk district in the southeastern part of the city, as there are no buildings on the block and the petitioner desires to make extensive improvements thereon and does not want the sidewalk until the improvements are decided upon. The block is bounded by Sixth and Seventh East and Fifth and Sixth South streets, and is the old exposition block. Martin favored the petition and moved that it be granted. He said that Mr. Keith would probably build a better sidewalk than that contemplated in the ordinance and hence it would be better to let him wait until he improved his property. A number of the councilmen opposed the proposition and said that it would not be right for the people to have to wade through mud on that block in order to get to the sidewalks all around it. The petition was lost by a vote of 2 to 13.

FIREMAN'S CLAIM.

Charles J. E. Gulbransen submitted the following claim for \$13.76 alleged to be the balance due him for services rendered as a member of the fire department during the month of January: "On Jan. 18, 1905, I was employed at the city fire department and for being 12 minutes late I was docked five days, making my salary for said month \$71.29. I consider the action of the chief unjust, inasmuch as his action is unprecedented, and almost every member of the department has at times been guilty of the same offense. At the time I signed the payroll I did so under protest. I now ask that you appropriate \$13.76 making my full pay for January, 1905."

Tuddenham moved that the compensation be fled. Martin wanted it referred to the fire committee, but he was stated that Gulbransen was docked for a violation of the rules of the department, so the motion to file was carried.

MAYOR'S VETO.

Mayor Morris submitted a veto of the Black resolution appropriating \$400 to connect the watermain across Eighth East at Second and Third South streets. The mayor opposed the appropriation, the money in his connection is not now needed and may interfere with the new water plans. Upon motion of Black the veto was laid over for one week.

PAVING OF ALLEYS.

The report of the committee, recommending the paving of the alleys and ground in the rear of the five and police stations, with asphalt at a cost of \$1,300, was adopted by the council.

SEWER PUMP SITE.

Upon recommendation of City Engineer, the council was approved for the purchase of a lot for the new sewer pump to be installed on Seventh North street.

DEPARTMENT PAYROLLS.

City Auditor Felt submitted the department payrolls for the last half of September amounting to \$15,889.94 which were referred to the committees with power to act.
