LOCAL BRIEFS.

The November term of the federal court will begin Nov. 13, while the setting of cases will take place Oct. 30.

D. D. Malloy has sold to Francis G. King for \$15,000, property on the west side of Commercial street, just north of the Commercial bank building.

A barn belonging to O. C. Brown, located at Tenth West and Eighth North, was destroyed by fire about 10 o'clock last night.

A telephone exchange has been installed by the Bell company at Gardfield Beach, with a switchboard of 300 subscribers capacity.

When the postoffice vacates its present quarters, the ground floor of the Doody building will be rented for office purposes, and it is understood that part of the premises will be occupied by the new Republican newspaper plant that is to come in here.

The Utah Light & Railway company is experimenting now with a late style of calcium chloride light which has strong powers of illumination.

The Dry Gulch Irrigation and Improvement company of Denver filed application yesterday afternoon with the state engineer, for 200 second feet of water from Lake Park Creek.

Eastern papers report a great scarcity of peppermint oil in the drug trade, owing to failure of the eastern peppermint crops, which in the middle states, the crops are not much better.

The five companies of the Twenty-ninth infantry at Fort Douglas "took a day off" yesterday from garrison duties, and in heavy marching order, put in the day marching into Big Cottonwood canyon and back again.
