Choate Says He is a Creature Without Scruple or Conscience

New York, Nov. 1.—Joseph H. Choate was the principal speaker tonight at a mass meeting in the regit hall, managed by members of the bar of New York, in support of the candidacy of Dist. Atty. William Travers Jerome. It was Mr. Choate's first appearance on a public platform in the United States since his appointment as ambassador to the court of St. James seven years ago.

In the course of his remarks Mr. Choate paid his respects to the political boss. He said: "We have great leaders whom we were proud to follow, such men as Seward, Greeley and Evarts, men of great brains, of high character, of patriotic honor, who only could be compared as equals to the great statesmen of the Republic. I wish I could get up a good definition of the word boss. It is a vulgar word, but there is no other word to express the meaning to which it is applied.
