LOCAL BRIEFS.

Strawberries are in the market from California at 25 cents per box.

The Street Car union meets this midnight to choose officers for the ensuing year.

A call has been issued by Secretary of State Tinney for a report from all the state and private banks in Utah of their condition at the close of business on Nov. 9.

A body of pupils from the Farmington school visited the local weather bureau yesterday afternoon, and were introduced into the mysteries of meteorological science.

The Colorado fish and game authorities have sworn in a lot of deputies who will endeavor to prevent the Indians from Utah fishing and hunting along Douglas creek this winter.

The Swedish Luthers surprised their pastor last evening with a surprise containing \$34 as an evidence of appreciation. The visitors brought ample refreshments with them.

The building committee of the state board of regents has been given power to act in the matter of the awarding of contracts for the hydraulic laboratory, and will report to a subsequent meeting of the board.

The government inspector declined last evening to lease the postoffice fixtures from Mr. Dooly, for use in the new federal building, and the office will therefore remain where it is until the new fixtures come. The furniture may not be here under six weeks.

The Anderson Real Estate & Investment company is preparing to invest nearly \$200,000 in building residences on the east side the coming spring. They claim there will be no building to speak of on the upper north bench until the street car service is extended up there.

Permission was asked last night of the city council by the Walker Bros. bank and granted for a new front for their bank building at Second South and Main streets. It will be of concrete and stone, and be similar in design to the fine new front of the Bank of the Republic.

W. D. S. Harrington, editor of the Western Commercial Advertiser, has won his libel suit against the Park City Record of Coalville. The Record printed remarks about plaintiff on the occasion of an advertising trip to the mine, which highly incensed him, hence the suit.

Articles of incorporation of the Gray Automobile company of this city have been filed with the secretary of state. Its capital stock is \$5,000, divided into shares of the par value of 25 cents each. W. H. Gray is president; Sidney M. Bamberger, vice president; J. B. Bean, secretary and treasurer.

Cartoonist Cutcut, who is now in this city, has severed his connection with the New York Herald, and will hereafter furnish Buster Brown pictures for a syndicate. The plates and matrices will be made in Denver. Mr. Cutcut will return to Salt Lake after a trip to Los Angeles, and lecture here. County Clerk Eldredge yesterday refused to issue a certificate for bounty on 13 coyote skins, and one fox skin. The papers were not attached to the coyote skins, hence the law was not complied with, and the bounty certificate was not issued. There is no bounty on fox skins, hence no certificate was issued for that.

The Pioneer stake authorities have arranged with Prof. Stephens to train a children's singing class of 300 members. The first meeting of this new organization will be held at the Pioneer stake house next Saturday in the Pioneer stake house. Other city stakes have in contemplation similar singing classes, and are conferring with Prof. Stephens in regard to the same.

TO ADVANCE WORK IN JUVENILE COURT

State Association Launched for The Purpose of Procuring Needed Legislation.

D. H. CHRISTENSEN PRESIDENT

Charter Members Include Court Officers in Salt Lake, Ogden, Provo and Logan.

The organization of the Juvenile Court association of Utah was completed yesterday afternoon at the Morris detention center by the election of the following officers: President, D. H. Christensen; first vice president, H. H. Thomas; second vice president, Mrs. H. Park; secretary-treasurer, Judge Willis Brown; members of board of directors, Mrs. McMahon, C. J. Freund, H. S. Joseph, M. A. Kellogg, Lewis Cardon.

PURPOSE OF ASSOCIATION. The purpose of the association as set forth in its articles is as follows: The object of this corporation shall be the procuring of needed legislation governing juvenile courts and the care and protection of delinquent and dependent children; the creating of public sentiment for the enforcement of laws affecting the conduct of juveniles; and the prosecution of adults who contribute to the delinquency and dependency of children; the forming of auxiliary organizations throughout the state of people directly interested in the above work; and for such other purposes as the by-laws of the association may prescribe.
