

QUEER CHARGE AGAINST DOWIE.

It is That He Had Agreed to Turn Zion City Over to the "Mormon" Church.

HE WILL NOT FLEE TO MEXICO

He Will Wage a Vigorous Legal War To Obtain Control of Things Again.

Chicago, April 12.—One of the charges that has been brought against Dowie—that to the effect that he had agreed secretly with a commission of "Mormon" missionaries to turn over to the "Mormon" Church Zion and all of its vast holdings, was emphatically denied by Dowie today.

The only possible basis for this story, it was explained, was that some months ago a coterie of "Mormon" missionaries appeared in Zion City and distributed pamphlets expounding the doctrines of "Mormonism." According to the statement of Dr. Dowie and his legal counselors, these men were immediately thrown out of the city.

Dowie was today deserted by his personal attendant, David Murdock, who has been with him for years. The reason is that Murdock's father has gone over to Volva.

Dr. John Alexander Dowie will not turn all and flee to Mexico. He will wage a vigorous legal warfare to remain control of Zion City, and as soon as he considers that he has taken the preliminary steps he will demand that place and proclaim himself the only and "first apostle." This statement is authorized by "Dr." Dowie himself and by the firm of lawyers who represent him.

In this connection Atty. F. C. Haley of the firm of Edson, Haley & Wetten, who represent Dowie and his co-conspirators, made the following statement: "We have advanced and will advance only one condition—the present restoration of power, temporal as well as ecclesiastical, and a demand for an absolute retraction of the slanderous statements made by General Overseer Volva and his followers against the moral character of Dowie."

"We are preparing a bill in chancery petitioning the courts to set aside the transfer of the property at Zion City made between General Overseer Volva and Deacon Alexander Granger, because the instrument was absolutely void. Dowie revoked the power of attorney which he delegated to Volva two days before the illegal transfer was made."

"Dowie will not immediately proceed to Zion City, but will remain in his apartments at the Auditorium annex in this city until every preliminary legal step has been taken. He will then proceed to Zion City and enter it with all of the power and authority which he possessed when he last left the place."

Despite the positive assertion on the part of Mr. Haley, attorneys for both factions were in numerous conferences through the day. Judge V. Y. Barnes, head of the legal department of the City of Zion, came to Chicago today and was closeted with Atty. Emil

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C. Wetten, representing Dowie, for a considerable length of time. What transpired between the two lawyers was not made public.

The attorneys for Dowie have secured an order from the postal department directing that all mail addressed to Dr. Dowie be delivered to his apartments in the annex. This they consider a very important strategic movement, as the majority of these letters are from members of the church remitting their tithes. This, they claim, will checkmate the general order sent out by Volva and his associates in Zion City ordering that no money be remitted to Dowie hereafter.

DOWIE'S HOME SOLD.

Muskegon, Mich., April 12.—In the lofty stand where in years past John Alexander Dowie, with great pomp and ceremony, delivered impassioned addresses to thousands assembled at Ben MacDhal, the splendid summer home of the former ruler of Zion City, an auctioneer today waved his hammer and sold for a paltry \$2,500 expensive furniture and fittings of Dowie's White lake establishment. It is estimated that the property sold today was worth \$20,000.

GERMANY URGES TURKEY TO RESIST GREAT BRITAIN.

London, April 13.—The Constantinople correspondent of the Express says that Germany is using diplomatic influence there to encourage Turkey to resist Great Britain in the dispute about the occupation of Tabah in the Sinai peninsula. The correspondent says he is informed authoritatively that the support the sultan is receiving from Berlin accounts for his obstinacy in the face of the clear declaration by the British government.

The Daily Telegraph's Cairo correspondent says he learns from the highest authority that the Turkish high commissioner in Egypt has made most important and unexpected demands of the khedive regarding Akabah, including the right to occupy any post Turkey desires in the Sinai peninsula without consulting Egypt, and that it is supposed the British authorities have formulated an uncompromising refusal to this.

PRECAUTIONS TO PROTECT JEWS

Melitopo, Russia, April 12.—On account of proclamations having been spread among the ignorant portion of the population of this place inciting them to attack the Jews by reviving the old bogey of the alleged sacrifice of Christian children by Jews, the city council has strengthened the police and taken other precautions to prevent excesses.

OAKLAND ORPHANAGE BURNED.

Oakland, April 12.—While funeral services were in progress today at the Ladies Relief home, a fire broke out in the orphanage building adjacent and destroyed it. There were four invalid children in the orphanage, and they were carried out by their little companions after the flames were discovered. Owing to the scarcity of water hy-

drants only one engine could be brought into service and the fire gained such headway that the orphanage could not be saved.

TORNADO SWEEPS OVER STATE OF KANSAS.

Wichita, Kan., April 12.—A special to the Eagle says that a tornado occurred at a place this evening at Stafford. Several persons were injured, seven houses and a church were completely destroyed and many other buildings were damaged.

The storm came from the southwest, passed over the business part of the town without damage, first striking two blocks east of Main street, here the home of Fred Turner and the parsonage of the Congregational church were demolished. The quaker church was blown down, the wind falling upon the home of Mrs. Ella Granger, which was also destroyed. Mrs. Granger was injured but not seriously.

Mrs. Ed. Grubbsburg saw the storm coming and ran into the yard to rescue her child which was playing there. Before she reached him she was picked up and hurled against a telephone pole across the street. She was seriously injured in the back. The child was unharmed.

The storm then lifted but struck again in the northeast part of the city, demolishing several houses and damaging others.

Four miles west of Stafford another tornado blew down several farm buildings and seriously injured R. V. Silvers, who saw the storm coming and ran into his granary filled with wheat. This storm passed two miles east of Hudson, where other small damage is reported. The sun shone brightly while these storms were working their havoc.

Another tornado is reported at Rushville, 30 miles north of Stafford. Several residences and other buildings were blown down. No one was seriously injured. Wires are down and little information can be obtained from Huston.

NORTHWESTERN MUTUAL CASE.

Milwaukee, April 12.—The committee selected by the Wisconsin legislature, in special session, for the investigation of life insurance companies, began its work in the investigation of the Northwestern Mutual. President Palmer of the company was the first witness.

Admissions were made which practically showed that the officials and trustees of the company were in a position to control its elections.

MONTANA PIONEER DEAD.

Dillon, Mont., April 12.—Word has been received from Brownville, Neb., conveying news of the death at that place of Lafayette Scott, one of Beaverhead's first pioneers and one of the best known old timers in Montana. Scott crossed the plains in a "prairie schooner," fighting the Indians en route. He has lost and won several fortunes in mining.

GEORGE B. HIBBARD DEAD.

Buffalo, N. Y., April 12.—George B. Hibbard, an old timer in Chicago, who argued the inland navigation case before the United States supreme court, the result being the establishment of the Great Lakes as inland seas, died last night, aged 82 years.

CHAMBER VOTES ALGERIAS CREDITS

Nation's Support Greatly Aided France in Attaining Success At Moroccan Conference.

A RESOLUTION OF CONFIDENCE

On Socialist Interpellation Demanding Amelioration of Postmen's Conditions.

Paris, April 12.—The chamber of deputies today voted the Algerias credits after a statement by Premier Bourgeois, during the course of which he said:

"The support of the nation greatly assisted the government in attaining success at the Moroccan conference. France's position as a Mussulman power and the security of her African colonies, depending upon the security of Morocco, necessitated a fixed policy in order to safeguard her interests."

"France has always recognized the independence of the sultan, and the principle of the open door, but she is unable to accept as to the co-operation of a third power in the control of the police. The protocol provides for commercial liberty and autonomy. France a pre-eminent position in connection with the state bank of Morocco, while giving France and Spain equal participation in the control of the police, conforming with French interests and satisfying the other powers."

The equitable decisions of the conference have been accepted without ulterior thoughts or bad humor anywhere. All the powers showed the desire during the discussions to subordinate their personal views to a good understanding, assuring in the future calm and confidence in the relations and strong alliances and friendships calculated to advance civilization, justice and peace."

In the chamber of deputies today a resolution of confidence in the government was adopted, 466 to 86, on a Socialist interpellation demanding an amelioration in the conditions of postmen and a recognition of their rights to federate.

M. Barthou, minister of public works, in responding to the interpellation, said that he would quit the minister in the event of the chamber disapproving of his action with regard to the striking postmen. The government, he said, was prepared to amblely consider the situation, but would concede nothing to menaces.

It was intolerable, the minister said, that the public service should be at the mercy of undisciplined employees. The government would not recognize a federation of postal employees for political purposes. Mr. Barthou added that refractory postmen would be dismissed unless they returned to work tomorrow.

The latter statement by Minister Barthou was in pursuance of a decision reached at the cabinet council today.

The handling of the mails is practically unaffected by the strike, as soldiers have been detailed to deliver the mails. Services are posted at the post-offices and railway depots guarding the arrivals and departures of mails.

DALRYMPLE'S REPORT ON CHICAGO'S RAILWAYS.

Glasgow, April 12.—The report which James Dalrymple, manager of the Glasgow corporation tramways made regarding the public service of Chicago at the request of Mayor Dunne, has just been published by the corporation of Glasgow.

Mr. Dalrymple in his report thanks Mr. Dunne on behalf of the corporation for the interest and information in the report, and says he had a most delightful and instructive trip, every person whom he met during his stay in Chicago was glad to allow him to visit Chicago was that Mr. Dunne might learn from his report the history of the corporation of Glasgow took over the operation of the street railways; also that he might have full details regarding the organization and management of a municipal street railway department, and whether the experience in Glasgow could be applied to the city of Chicago.

Liberals have majority.

St. Petersburg, April 12.—The statistics regarding the 175 members so far elected to the Russian congress parliament show that the Liberals have an overwhelming majority and that only five representatives are classed as reactionary, while the Constitutional Democrats and their more radical allies are represented by 87 representatives. The Progressive party has only 15 representatives, and the Octoberists, thirty-five representatives are classed either as independent or their political allegiance is stated to be unknown.

Among these, however, are persons whom the Constitutional Democrats expect to vote with them, to the agrarian program of their party.

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
