LOCAL BRIEFS.

To Deliver Oration—Rev. Peter Simpkin left for Beaver yesterday afternoon where he will today deliver the Fourth of July oration.

Stole a Bicycle—A young man named Walter Edegar, aged 18 years, was arrested last evening on the charge of petty larceny. It is charged that he stole a bicycle belonging to Frank Bricker. Edgar had the wheel in his possession when arrested.

Cramer Discharged—C. E. Cramer, the young man who was arrested some time ago on the charge of robbing a Greek named J. Eranatos of \$104.50, will not have to defend himself in court. This morning the case was dismissed by the county attorney.

Prisoner Goes Back—Last evening City Detective Jones of Los Angeles, left for that city having in his custody Robert S. McCall, the young man arrested for embezzlement. Detective Jones was in the city here and was entertained by Capt. J. B. Burdick.

Vagrant Jailed—A vagrant giving the name of T. L. Larch was arrested at the Salt Palace last night because of his persistent begging. The fellow is a cripple and was taken to the jail where he will be held until he can be located by his relatives.

Working on Bridge—It is the intention of the contractor having the work in hand to complete the bridge over City creek connecting the road and running up the canyon with the Washach drive this week. As soon as the bridge is completed the teamsters will again start in grading the drive which will be completed at an early date.

Articles Filed—Articles of incorporation of the Security Storage & Commission company of this city have been filed in the office of the county clerk. The company is capitalized at \$100,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each. S. H. Love is president; R. H. Allison, vice president; F. J. Fabian, secretary and treasurer.

"Dope" Fleed Arrested—Raymond Curtis, a "dope" fiend with a long record, is in trouble and also in jail again. Curtis is in trouble most of the time because he apparently can't resist the desire to appropriate other persons' property. He was trying to sell some stolen clothing when Officer Price saw him and took him to jail.

Skating Risk Opened—Mr. Argh Hossey of Pasadena has rented the hall opposite the postoffice and turned it into a skating rink. Ladies are given free admission every morning from 10 to 12 and on Friday evening select skating parties are given by invitation. The management state that they will conduct an up-to-date and perfectly respectable skating parlor.

Home Agency—The Home Agency company of this city has filed its articles of incorporation with the county clerk. Its capital stock is \$8,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each. A. H. Ensign is president; L. Elder, vice president; T. H. Cartwright, secretary and treasurer. The company will engage in a general insurance agency business.

C. E. Wood's Condition—Word was received today from the bedside of Charles E. Wood, former assistant fire chief of this city, who contracted a fever of blood poisoning last week by running a fish hook into his finger, that his condition today is not as favorable as it was yesterday. He had spent a very restless night, but his physicians are still confident of his recovery.

Advance in Salary—Cashier David E. Evans of the internal revenue office here has been notified that he will receive an advance in salary of \$100 a year, and the deputy in charge of the internal office gets an advance of \$200. His announcement follows the receipt by Internal Revenue Collector Callister of the allowance for his department for the ensuing year. No changes have been made at the branch offices at Butte, Helena and Boise.

Another One Held—Justice of the Peace Dana T. Smith yesterday held to the district court in \$500 bonds George Nicaras, a Greek, who is charged with engaging in a plot of kidnapping. H. George Pappas, accused of a similar offense, took a change of venue from Judge Smith's court to that of Justice F. M. Bishop. He, however, failed to show up for his appearance, and was bound over in a like sum to answer to a higher court.

Little Girl Hurt—Bessie Chase, the 8-year-old daughter of Detective Geo. Chase of the Salt Lake police force, was painfully injured at the family residence, 1177 Emerson avenue, yesterday afternoon. The little girl was riding a bicycle and fell from it while running to the assistance of the tot, Bessie fell and dislocated her left arm at the elbow. A physician was quickly summoned and attended to the injury. The child is now resting easily.

Car Hit Wagon—About 5 o'clock last evening there was a smash up between a street car and a brewery wagon, the latter in charge of Otto Grov. The car was on the Ashton avenue line and the accident happened at Ninth East and Ninth South. As the wagon was crossing the tracks the car ran into it. Grov was thrown from the seat and his left leg was broken. The wagon was badly damaged. Grov was taken to the L. D. S. hospital where his broken leg was set by Dr. Joseph S. Richards.

Mrs. Mahan Dead—Mrs. Cora May Mahan, formerly Miss Gordon, died yesterday morning at the family residence, 48 east First North street, of a lingering illness. She was born at Rocktown, Iowa, in 1876, and lived for some years with her parents in Denver. In 1895 she was married to Archibald G. Mahan, and for seven years Salt Lake has been their home. A sister, Miss Ella Gordon, lives here, and two sisters, Mrs. W. M. Merrill and Mrs. T. J. Brown, are residents of Grand Junction, Colo. The funeral will be held from Unity hall Thursday afternoon, at 3:30 o'clock.

Levy Arrested Again—M. Levy, the junk dealer charged with receiving stolen property, was again arrested yesterday on a second charge of the same character. A complaint was issued against Levy and sworn to by F. E. Hanson on behalf of the Rio Grande Western Railway company. It is alleged that Levy purchased \$100 worth of journal brass from Harry Leroy and Bert Miller who stole the same from the railroad company. Levy was taken before Judge Whitaker and was admitted to bail. A third complaint will probably be issued against Levy upon request of the Rio Grande.

Just Made a Bluff—Deputy Sheriff Sizer yesterday arrested F. J. Angier, a driver for the Standard laundry, upon the charge of assault with intent to commit murder. It is alleged that Angier pulled a revolver on Charles Miller and threatened to kill him. The trouble occurred in Charles Langley's saloon and it is claimed by Angier that Miller struck him in the face and broke his eye glasses. Angier then pulled his revolver and made the threat. He claims that he was loaded with blank cartridges, and that he merely made a bluff to protect himself from the assault of Miller who is a much larger man than Angier.

SENATOR SMOOT HOME

Returns to Utah in Time to Spend Fourth with Citizens of Provo.

Senator Reed Smoot arrived in Salt Lake yesterday from Washington, D. C., and in the afternoon proceeded to his home in Provo, where he will spend the Fourth. Senator Smoot is looking and feeling well, and expressed himself as being pleased with the results of his labors during the last session of Congress.

Mr. Smoot said that he is taking no part in the Ogdin postoffice appointment, leaving that matter entirely in the hands of Representative Lovell. He stated also that he desired the earliest possible action on his own case when Congress meets again. He has sought no delay, but the court has been so cautious from the beginning that the question as to whether or not he should hold his seat should be settled. He has no misgivings as to the final outcome.

ALARMING REPORTS

Caused by W. H. Babcock Hitting His Wife with a Magazine.

W. H. Babcock was given a hearing before Justice of the Peace Holm of Murray yesterday upon the charge of disturbing the peace and was fined \$10 or sentenced to serve 10 days in jail. Babcock did not pay the fine, and consequently is serving his sentence. The trouble created by Babcock was simply a family disturbance which had all been settled by the time the deputy sheriff arrived on the scene. Babcock lives about a mile east of Murray and on Monday night was reading a magazine when his wife commenced teasing him. She kept up her sport until he became angry and hit her in the face with the book. She ran from the house screaming "murder" at the top of her voice. The neighbors became alarmed and a report was sent to the marshal at Murray that the man was killing his wife. The marshal at once called upon Sheriff Emery for help and three reports were received by the latter official in regard to the matter. One was that Babcock had killed his wife, another was that he had killed his wife and children and the third was that after killing his whole family he had barricaded himself in the house and threatened to kill everyone who came within range of his gun.

Several deputy sheriffs were sent hurriedly to the scene. They were armed to the teeth and expected trouble. But instead of finding what they prepared for they found Babcock just getting ready to retire for the night and his family all asleep as though there had been no trouble. He had been talking with his wife and everything was lovely. The deputies, however, arrested Babcock and brought him to jail and yesterday he was sentenced as stated above.

LARGE TRANSFERS OF REAL ESTATE

An Annex to the Emery-Holmes Building to be Erected.

DR. GROVES PROPERTY SOLD.

S. C. Wing Disposes of it for Sum of \$140,000 on an Eastern Party.

The property once owned by the late Dr. Groves, and left by him towards the endowment of the Groves L. D. S. hospital, has lately been sold to an eastern party for the sum of \$140,000. S. C. Wing was the seller, and the sale was consummated by the firm of Little & Little. The property is 135 by 12 1/2 feet, at the corner of First South and First West streets, and once changed hands during "boom" days, at \$90,000. Several other large transfers of real estate are announced, the most important of which consists of the premises immediately adjoining on the north the Emery-Holmes apartments. Mrs. Fred Clawson for a consideration of \$12,000, and the lot on the corner of First street, 60 by 115 feet was sold by A. Fred Wey for \$15,000. An annex to the Emery-Holmes building will be erected on the newly acquired property. John S. Bransford made the purchase for the Emery-Holmes, and W. J. Halloran put the deal through.

Kelsey & Gillespie have sold for James T. Beells the entire block between Second and Fourth streets, and north and south west to Messrs. G. R. Bothwell and R. E. McConaughy, for \$15,000. The purchasers will erect a number of residences on the property in the near future.

The property immediately north of the Miller hotel on State street has been bought by F. Mulrooney of Denver. The frontage is 124, with a depth of 240 feet, and \$18,000 was paid for the piece. The oldrickety building which has been an eyesore for years is being razed and will be replaced with neat store buildings.
