#### SPARROW WINS.

New York, Sept. 11.—Charles J. Swain's Sparrow, the winner of the reliability trials on Monday, won the long distance race of 12.5 nautical miles to Poughkeepsie and return today in the second day of the carnival of the Motor Boat Club of America. She covered the course in 6 hours 45 minutes 30 seconds, finishing 46 minutes after Payne Whitney's Artful, which lost the race by 1 hour and 46 seconds. The Sparrow had an allowance of over three hours, while the Artful got less than two hours allowance. The Artful today averaged a triple over 21 miles an hour, while the Sparrow made less than 20.
