

KILLED ON THE ROCK ISLAND

Two Trainmen Dead, Another Probably Dead and a Fourth Fatally Injured.

WAS A HEAD-ON COLLISION.

Passenger Train and a Freight Ran in Opposite Directions on the Same Track.

Kansas City, Mo., Jan. 15.—Two trainmen are known to be dead, another probably fatally injured and several passengers were slightly injured in a wreck at Waldron, Missouri, 12 miles from Leavenworth, Kansas, last night, caused by a head-on collision between Rock Island passenger train number 26 and a freight train.

THE DEAD.

Engineer James McQueen, of the freight train.
Baggage man Charles Hart, of Kansas City.

Engineer King, of the passenger train, of Kansas City, is missing and is believed to be buried under the wreckage.

THE INJURED.

Fireman George Smallwood, of St. Joseph, who was badly injured and will probably die.
Mrs. Mark Williams of Kansas City; back bruised.
H. H. Long, Belden, Mo., bruised.
H. Adams, flagman at Waldron, injuries light.

Fireman Smallwood of the passenger train, who was taken to Leavenworth at 2:30 this morning, was the only one of the injured who was dangerously hurt. The injured passengers continued on their journey.

The freight train had orders to wait for the passenger at Waldron, but the switchman there had left the switch open and the passenger, running at full speed, crashed into the freight train. Both engines were demolished and two of the passenger coaches, the baggage car and smoker, were derailed and dented. The other coaches were badly jarred. The passenger train was scheduled to leave St. Joseph at 7:20 p. m., but was delayed there by an accident in the railroad yards.

New York, Jan. 14.—The ballot boxes containing the ballots cast for mayor in the election of 1905 were today ordered by Justice Leventritt to be placed in the custody of the New York board of elections. He vacated the order granted by Justice Hendricks, which gave the boxes into the custody of Atty. Gen. Jackson.

Justice Leventritt issued the order after a hearing on an application by the board of elections to have the boxes originally placed in the care of that board by order of Justice Gaynor on application of W. R. Hearst, the defeated

Chicago, Jan. 15.—The establishment of a branch of the National Civil Federation in Chicago, was decided upon definitely yesterday at a conference presided over by Franklin McVeagh, who was chairman of the labor meeting held last Saturday night at Mrs. Potter Palmer's residence.

FEARLESS LAWS NOW IN EFFECT

Whole of New Statute, Applying To Thousands of Staple Articles, in Force.

PASSING OF RAILROAD PASSES

Proposed Stock Company to Manage Coal and Asphaltum Lands in Indian Territory.

Washington, Jan. 11.—The national pure food law went into effect on the first of the month. The new act applies to thousands of staple articles of food used throughout the length and breadth of the land, and until they have time to ascertain just how far they may or may not go under it manufacturers and dealers will exercise unusual care in order to avoid possible violations. The act is intended to prevent the manufacture, sale or transportation of adulterated, misbranded, poisonous or deleterious foods, drugs, medicines and liquors and to regulate the traffic of such articles. The department of agriculture has framed regulations under which a beginning may be made in the application of the law, but it will probably be months before all the evils which the supporters of the legislation had in mind are reached. Because of this fact the belief has become current that only a part of the provisions of the new law are being put into effect with the beginning of the new year, and Secretary Wilson has been at some pains to give the country to understand that this is not the case and that the whole of the statute is now in effect. If goods are now in the market do not bear labels showing exactly what they consist of, purchasers should take steps to bring the matter to the attention of the authorities. The old labels were used until Oct. 1, but in addition there must be labels stating the exact contents of the packages offered for sale.

NO MORE PASSES.

Other new laws of importance which were enacted by the first session of the present Congress, but which did not become effective until Jan. 1, are the so-called free alcohol act and the provision of the rate law which prohibits the issuance of interstate passes by railroads. Exceptions are made in the case of employees, clergymen, indentured persons, inmates of hospitals and charitable institutions and others, including some agents of the government, but the giving of free transportation to legislators, newspaper men and the public generally is barred. The free alcohol bill removes the internal revenue tax from alcohol which has been denatured for use in the arts and industries, as fuel, etc. It is expected that the legislation will give farmers and small users of power generally a fuel which will be much cheaper than any other.

AN INDIAN TRUST.

Within the next day or two a bill is to be introduced in Congress having for its object the management by a joint stock company of the coal and asphaltum lands in the Indian Territory belonging to the Choctaw and Chickasaw tribes. The plan was worked out by Indian Commissioner F. E. Leupp and is under the supervision of the president. Officers of the government and representatives of the tribes named are to control the proposed trust, which, in the opinion of Commissioner Leupp, will do away with all the many complications and irregularities which the enormous value of the lands in question and the methods of administering them have brought about in the past. Many members of Congress will oppose the scheme on the ground that it savors too strongly of state socialism and would strip the public utilities, which is not popular among the legislators, not even among the followers of Mr. Bryan, who has announced that he favors government ownership.

FOR A NEGRO REPUBLIC.

Another bill which will be introduced shortly and which has resulted in considerable comment by reason of its close connection with the Brownsville incident is one by Representative Gillespie of Texas which provides for the establishment of a negro republic in Africa under the supervision of the United States. It is not Mr. Gillespie's plan to forcibly deport negroes, but to have the government pay the expense of transporting to the proposed republic all who are dissatisfied with conditions in this country. "There is no race hatred in my scheme," said Mr. Gillespie in discussing it. "It is actuated wholly by a spirit to do what is best for all races."

MANY LETTERS TO LOEB.

The Hon. William Loeb, Jr., secretary to President Roosevelt, probably reads and replies to more letters in the course of a day than any other man in the United States. The number of letters received at the White House each day is rarely less than 300, and frequently it is as high as 1,000. Many of the letters are intended for the president, but a very large number are addressed to Mr. Loeb personally. He has several stenographers at his command, and ordinarily all of them are busy. The old-timers among the employees of the executive offices say that Mr. Loeb's personal mail—or at least the mail which is addressed to him, in spite of the fact that many of the letters touched on some interesting but personal—is larger than that of any of the men who have preceded him in the position he has held since the promotion of George Bruce Cortelyou to the cabinet.

SAN FRANCISCO REFUGEES.

Just as Many Dependent on Los Angeles Charity as Ever.

Los Angeles, Jan. 15.—The list of San Francisco refugees dependent on the Los Angeles citizens' relief fund is as large as it ever has been. Capt. F. Edward Gray, secretary of the relief commission, says he is "puzzled to know when the stream of refugees will end."

About \$2,000 monthly still is being spent to relieve the necessities of the refugees.

Of the original fund of \$100,000, \$35,000 has been spent for San Francisco refugees. Ten thousand dollars of the amount has been sent to Chile. In response to a call from the rehabilitation committee of the relief and Red Cross committees, in San Francisco, \$10,000 was sent north last week by H. S. Gurley, assistant secretary of the chamber of commerce.

ACTOR COGHLAN'S BODY FOUND.

Chicago, Jan. 15.—A dispatch to the Tribune from Galveston, Tex., says: "The body of Charles Coghlan, the playwright and actor, which has been lost since the storm of Sept. 8, 1906, has been found in its metal coffin on the mainland in an out-of-the-way place. Hunters came on the coffin almost

ALFONSO'S ASSAILANTS.

Friends and Associates Bending Every Effort to Save Them.

Madrid, Jan. 15.—Friends and party associates of Senor Ferrer, director of an anarchistic school at Barcelona, and Jose Nakens, editor of the Madrid El Matin, are bending every effort to secure the release of the men who are soon to be tried for alleged complicity in the attempt to kill King Alfonso and Queen Victoria with a bomb immediately after their wedding last May.

The Radical and Anarchist parties are taking a deep interest in the case and they are spending large sums to further their ends. Committees on behalf of the prisoners have been organized in Barcelona, Madrid, Seville, Valencia and Saragossa.

The threat has been made that if the two men are condemned deeds of violence will follow in order to avenge them.

A BERLIN LOCK-OUT.

Berlin, Jan. 15.—A great lockout of carpenters and joiners has been instituted here because of the non-compliance of the unionists with the demand of the Master Carpenters' association. The number of men locked out is 15,000.

Time by Cat's Eyes.

So long as there is a cat anywhere near, it is not necessary to have a watch or a clock, for the animal's eyes will tell you the time of day. The first European to learn of the use of a cat as a time indicator was M. Hue, who in a work on the Chinese Empire, tells how he was initiated into the mystery.

M. Hue and a party of friends set out to visit a Chinese Christian mission settlement among the peasantry. They met a young Chinese on the road, and to test his intelligence, they asked him if he could tell them the time. The native looked up at the sky, but the clouds hid the sun from view, and he couldn't read any answer there. Suddenly he darted away to a farm and returned in a few minutes with a cat in his arms. Pushing up its eyelids with his hand, he told Hue to look at them, at the same time volunteering the information that it was not noon yet. While they were puzzling over the case the boy went about his business.

When the party reached the village they asked the Chinese converts if they could tell the time by a cat's eyes, and how it was done. Immediately there was a wild hunt, and all the cats obtainable in the neighborhood were brought before them.

The Chinese pointed out that the pupils of a cat's eyes were gradually narrowed up to 12 noon, when they became scarcely perceptible lines, drawn perpendicularly across the eye and after that dilation recommenced. Hue examined the eyes of several cats and verified what the Chinese had told him.—Unidentified.

AMERICAN OYSTER OPPORTUNITY.

Consul-General Soren Listow writes from Rotterdam that the Dutch oyster, which is of the size of the American "blue point" and considered quite a delicacy in Europe, has this year been found diseased.

Many persons who have partaken of the bivalves have as a consequence suffered severe illness owing to their systems having become poisoned, though as far as known no deaths have as yet resulted. People have, however, naturally abstained from eating Dutch oysters, but an Amsterdam newspaper, the Algemeen Handelsblad now claims that "the cases of illness, which have resulted from the eating of Dutch oysters, have occurred exclusively after the consumption of oysters which had been imported from the harbor and the cause of the disease among the oysters at that place is a sudden change in the water in the harbor, and in the river Zoom, owing to the fact that two sugar factories have been started at Bergen on Zoom, which discharge their refuse in the harbor. The cause of the disease among the oysters is therefore confined to the locality mentioned and is of only a temporary nature, and there is no reason why Dutch oysters are nevertheless at present tabooed from all menus, and American oyster dealers may probably find a good market in Europe this winter. Aside from this fact, however, it may be of interest to American oyster breeders to know that sugar factories or refineries should not be allowed near oyster beds.
