LOCAL BRIEFS.

Will Preach Easter Sermon—Very Rev. Dean Phillip R. Harris of Toronto, Canada, will preach the Easter sermon, Sunday morning, in St. Mary's cathedral. He is en route to California and is expected to visit with Bishop Scanlan.

Business Is Growing—The Salt Lake custom house reports a big business for this time of year. The department at Washington has sent on a complete and fine set of instruments and measuring apparatus for the collector, and given him additional office room.

Singing Evangelist—Prof. D. P. Stout of Philadelphia began last evening, a two weeks series of revivals at the Baptist church in Murray. Prof. Stout is called the singing evangelist and has returned to his native city to join operatic companies as a baritone, preferring to remain in evangelistic work.

Thomas Judd Re-elected—A meeting of the state board of agriculture was held yesterday in the Chamber of Commerce at which the new horticultural laws passed by the recent legislature were gone over and action taken towards securing returns as provided in the new law and towards a closer inspection of nursery stock. Thomas Judd was re-elected president of the board and Edward Taylor was re-elected secretary.

To Be Deported—The immigration office has received orders from Washington to deport several persons. Baburic, an insane native of Hungary and who has been in the insane asylum at Provo since December last. It has been shown that he is insane before coming to this country. So Inspector Longley will take the man to Boston, April 12 next, the steamship company that brought him over, and paying half of the traveling expenses from Salt Lake to Boston, and then taking entire charge of him after that.
