ENCAMPMENT IS GREAT SUCCESS

Camp D. A. Callahan at American Fork Named in Honor of Patron Of High School Athletics.

CADETS ALL WELL AGAIN.

Harry Week, Who Fainted From Exhaustion Completely Recovered—All Well With Cadets.

(Special to the "News.") Camp D. A. Callahan, American Fork, June 14.—The cadet encampment is a complete success. Harry Week, of company C, who fainted away yesterday afternoon on the march between Lohi and American Fork, has completely recovered, as have also 10 others who dropped out on account of exhaustion.

FINISH THEIR MARCH. The cadets finished their long hike from Salt Lake to American Fork at 12 o'clock, noon, yesterday. They were met at the camp by a detail of 12 men under Lieut. Stephen Beesley. These men went to the camping grounds Wednesday morning and pitched tents for the battalion. Three cooks were also with them, and a fine meal was awaiting the tired and hungry cadets when they arrived.

TWO NEW ORDERS. At 7 o'clock last evening the cadets assembled for retreat parade, and Captain West gave out the following orders: Order No. 1.—"The camp will be known as Camp D. A. Callahan in honor of the man who has done so much for high school athletics in this city."

AMERICAN FORK'S WELCOME. The cadets visited American Fork on the march, and were met there by William Thornton, president, H. Stout, vice president, and J. W. Stoops, secretary of the Commercial club, who gave them a hearty welcome to the city. The boys marched to Main street and halted in front of Chapman's store. They then counter-marched to camp, and although they were very tired, they sang as they marched. "Hail, Hail, the Gang's all here."

PRETTY CAMP SITE. Camp D. A. Callahan is situated on a very pretty spot on the timber grass lands, about a mile south of American Fork and a quarter of a mile from Utah lake. High snow capped hills are on the south, the beautiful lake winds out to the west, and a long expanse of fertile country stretches northward, making the spot an ideal one for camping purposes.

MUSIC WAS FURNISHED BY A quartet composed of D. J. Watts, Alexander Crawford, Mary Romney Ross and Gertrude Romney, and Lonnie Romney acting as accompanist. The songs rendered by the quartet were "I Need Thee Every Hour," "Nearer My God to Thee," and "Christians, Good Night," while Mary Romney sang, "The Beautiful City," with chorus accompaniment. Benediction was pronounced by Elder D. J. Watts. Many beautiful offerings were placed on the altar. The remains were interred in the city cemetery, where A. T. Christensen dedicated the grave.

Berlin, June 14.—Dr. Franz Joseph, son of a well known financier, engaged rooms yesterday while posing as a stranger in Berlin. He was found dead in his room, and an hour or so later shots were heard. The door was forced and, lying a few yards away, were found the bodies of Joseph and the woman. Both were dead, having been shot through the head. Nearby were two revolvers. The woman was identified as Frau Gotti Bugottlieb, a prominent society leader, who has a wealthy husband. Joseph was unmarried.

BOHEMIAN FREE THINKERS.
