\$25,000 DAMAGE SUIT SPARED

Richard Anderson Sues Con. Gold Mining Company for Injury to Leg.

RUNAWAY ENDS IN DISASTER.

George E. Brooks Suffers a Broken Leg—Obsequies of George Fife—Wedding Bells.

Ogden, July 31.—A \$25,000 damage suit has been prepared by Magnus and Corn to be filed in the Third district court by Richard Anderson against the Consolidated Gold Mining company and Charles Lias. It is alleged in the complaint that April 28, 1907, plaintiff was employed by the defendants to haul tailings from the Golden Gate mine. That he was performing his work with due carefulness on the date mentioned, but the defendants carelessly and negligently permitted the rails on which the cars were being run to get out of repair and one of the cars tipped over upon plaintiff, badly crushing his right leg so that he has to use of it and otherwise injured him, to his damage in the sum of \$25,000.

He was delivering goods to homes on Madison avenue, when the horse became frightened at something in the road and dashed along the street. The driver, Brooks could not manage the horses and they turned and ran down Twenty-second street hill at a great speed. The delivery wagon collided with a street car, throwing Brooks out with great force, fracturing his left leg between the knee and partially demolishing the socket. He was picked up and taken to his home, where a doctor reduced the fracture, and it is believed he will get along all right.

EUREKA. MINERS CELEBRATE. Union Workers Parade in Honor of Haywood's Acquittal—Accident.

MAYOR OF JUAREZ, MEXICO. SUDDENLY DISAPPEARS. El Paso, Tex., July 30.—Silvano Montemayor, mayor of the city of Juarez and one of the most influential citizens of the state of Chihuahua, has disappeared. Juarez has been in a fever of excitement since the capture of a party of smugglers and the arrest of over 30 persons, including six of the most prominent business men of the town.

Tonight the federal authorities seized 14 cars consigned as coal to Mayor Montemayor and found that five of the cars were loaded with drug goods, clothing, shoes, etc. A thin layer of coal covered the merchandise in each case. Montemayor's warehouses, goods and papers were seized also as was the large mercantile establishment of Ketterson & Degetau. Yardmaster Villanueva of the Mexican Central and a large number of Mexican switchmen and carloaders were jailed today. The authorities say that the evidence secured by them implicated a clerk in the Banco Nacional, one Lecocier, and the son of Arguelles, a prominent custom broker, both of whom escaped to this side of the river today.
