Milk Tests Have Good Results—Milk wagons were the especial guest of Walter J. Frazier yesterday when he sought out a dozen or more of them and took samples of the milk offered for sale in them. These samples he turned over to Herman Harris, state, county and city chemist, for analysis. The samples with a single exception showed well. This exception was a sample of cream taken from one of the wagons of one of the city's largest dairies. It fell one or two points below the standard for butter fat. The standard set by the law for whipping cream is 27 per cent of butter fat, that for coffee cream, 18 per cent. There were no deleterious substances found in the analysis, the law being so plain on this point that dealers generally seem to observe it.

Murray Seven-Year-Olds Are to Be Among the Features Next Month.

FREE VETERINARY CLINICS.

To Be Instituted by Special Arrangement With the Authorities of the Logan Agricultural College.

Secretary H. S. Ensign of the State Fair association this morning announced that an honorary member of the Anti-Race Suiicide club had come to the front with a special premium for triplets born and reared in Utah. The premium carries with it a blue ribbon and a cash bonus of \$30.
