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HOTEL GOSSIP.

Mark Musgrove, a mining man of Reno, is at the Cullen. That a majority of the best people of Nevada are in favor of retaining the federal troops at Goldfield, temporarily at least, is the opinion of Mr. Musgrove. He thinks that it is entirely proper for the president of the United States to station soldiers anywhere within the country's boundaries, and he sees no good reason why a locality infested with malcontents and viciously inclined persons should be an exception. The very fact that the governor, senators and representatives of Nevada asked that the troops be sent, is, in the opinion of Mr. Musgrove sufficient reason why the troops should be permitted to remain, at least until in the judgment of those best able to judge they are no longer necessary.
