THE SWANSEA MINES.

Their Consolidation Now Believed to Be a Certainty. The report was current on the street after the close of the morning call of the mining exchange today that the deal which has been pending for the turning a control of the South Swansea mine over to Jesse Knight had been consummated. C. V. Wheeler, one of the directors and large shareholders of the latter, when seen this afternoon declared the report to be premature. He admitted, however, that the transaction had progressed to the point where it might be closed almost any time. It is understood that plans are being made to consolidate the two companies. The Swansea properties have been inactive for a number of years on account of the lower workings being flooded with water. The old Swansea passed to Mr. Knight several months ago, who bought a central to insure a permanent water supply for the smelter, or now being constructed. Scarcely any ore has been extracted below the water level. Both the Swansea and South Swansea were dividend payers for a number of years.

DIRECT FROM OIL FIELD.

POWER FOR IRON COUNTY CAMPS

Local and Eastern Syndicate May Build Big Plant At Modena.

THE FIELD A VERY GOOD ONE

Will Have Support of Mine Owners—Shipment from Jennie Mine.

It was learned from an authoritative source today that a strong syndicate of local and eastern capitalists are about to build a large electric power plant at Modena, Iron county, with the view of supplying the camps of Gold Springs, Stateline, Bull Valley, Deer Lodge and possibly Pioche, with power and light. Representatives of the syndicate who have been looking over the field have expressed themselves as being well pleased with the opportunity presented for profitable investment and have received much encouragement from the owners of Gold Springs, Stateline, Deer Lodge and Bull Valley. All these camps are in a very prosperous condition at the present time and there is every indication that rapid progress will be made in the way of development in the near future. The success of the Jennie Gold Mining company in Nevada has been a signal for increased interest being taken in these southern camps. In Deer Lodge some telling work has been accomplished at the beginning of the year. Enough has been done to remove every question of doubt about it becoming one of the most productive gold and silver districts in the west and the probability of the production of several new mills, will have become an accomplished fact before another year rolls around. It comes from excellent source that the deal which has been pending for some time for the sale of the Wild Irish group is about to be consummated and that several well-known groups at Stateline are being rounded up to form the basis for the organization of another strong company. The shipment of 216 sacks of concentrate was received at one of the local samplers from the Jennie mill today. The product has a valuation of from \$125 to \$130 per ton; also 106 sacks of lead ore from the Ophir mine at Stateline.

DAY MINE STRIKE.

In Pioche the recent strike in the Day mine of the Nevada Utah company is regarded as being important and the Record of last Saturday says: "The ore was discovered in what is known as the east drift on the tunnel level. The ore in many places across the ledge will assay as high as 3,000 ounces silver per ton, as well as carrying good lead values. The entire breadth of eight feet will average up well into the hundreds of ounces. Work on the ledge since the discovery the early part of the year has been steady and increasing, and it is thought that one of the largest and richest strikes in the history of the Day mine was discovered here. "The Day has been looked to in later years chiefly for the tonnage of low-grade ore it was in a position to furnish, and it is now being looked to for rich bodies of any mine. These are what might be termed low grade, but are of great magnitude. This recent strike has shown it to be one of the richest, but richness as well in the lower workings, and it is safe to predict that the Day within a short while will be the greatest mine ever discovered in the district. "Great credit is due Manager Gaskill, Superintendent Wilkes and Foreman Locks for the manner in which they are bringing the Day mine to the front."

BOSTON CONSOLIDATED.

Director Schirmer Explains Situation At Bingham in the East. F. A. Schirmer, director of the Boston Con., upon his return to Boston a few days ago, after having visited this state, is quoted as saying: "I was informed by some engineers that within 90 days we should be able to furnish our new mill with at least 2,000 tons of ore a day. The mill is now producing 700 tons per cent from our porphyry ores, which we consider satisfactory. At times the recovery has been as high as 75 per cent, and the cost of extraction is very low. The trouble has been that our ore, taken from the top of the mountain, where it was deemed advisable to start the steam shovel work, have shown a higher percentage of iron than was originally figured upon, and iron in too great a quantity is undesirable, as it inflates the cost of extraction. Therefore, to our cost and reduces the concentration. "Of course, we have quantities of ores in the lower portion of our property which do not carry the high iron percentages. In fact millions of tons of ore in this section are available for extraction. We will operate upon this ore until we are able to bring the iron ores in the upper sections. This is a metallurgical problem which, undoubtedly, will be solved. We have already secured a prominent metallurgist to work it out."

Stevenson, formerly assistant general manager of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Co., began service with the Independent Coal & Coke Co., this week, as the Carbon county News. STOCKS ACTIVE AND HIGHER

Opened at Advance, Which Profit-Taking Checked. Then Rise Was Resumed.

METALS ARE IN BIG DEMAND

Large Orders in Them Executed—Railroads Went Up—Bonds Were Irregular.

New York, April 28.—Opening prices of stocks today were not much changed from those of last night, although the dealers were active, and varied. Gains and losses were quite evenly divided. Atchison and Canadian Pacific fell 1/4 and Missouri Pacific and Amalgamated Copper 1/2. Manhattan sold at an advance of 2 1/2 and Norfolk and Western and Southern Railway preferred 1/4. Profit-taking sales checked the advance, but the market recovered successively higher levels after the rise was resumed. St. Paul was pushed up 3/4, and there also were heavy purchases of Reading, Union Pacific and the Hill stocks at advances of 1 to 1 1/4. The metal industrials were easier. The market continued to show great animation and breadth until well into the second hour when a pause ensued and there was some reaction. The Pacific and Reading rose a fraction higher than the rest. Lackawanna sold at an advance of 3/4, Atlantic Coast Line 3/4, Louisville & Nashville 3/4, Great Northern preferred and Northern Pacific 3/4, Pressed Steel Car preferred 1/2, and Southern Pacific, Missouri Pacific and New York Central 1/4 to 1 1/4. There were some conspicuous laggards in the movement, including the metal industrials, Pennsylvania, Atchison, which ruled not far from last night's prices. The market turned strong again at noon. Large buying orders were executed in the metal stocks and when these began to rise vigorously, the railroad stocks also got higher. Realizing sales in the grain carriers continued until the specialists were strong, which eventually undermined the rise and the entire market receded and became quiet. Delaware and Hudson rose 4 points, Consolidated Gas 3 1/2, Paul preferred 2 1/4, Southern Pacific 2, American Smelting 1/4, and Canadian Pacific, Pacific coast, and the United States Steel stocks, Amalgamated Copper, Anaconda, Erie, Great Northern, Lackawanna, Steel Car and Corn products, 1 to 1 1/4. Interborough Metropolitan pfd. yielded 1/2. A spirited demand arose again for Union Pacific which lifted it to 12 1/2, a rise of 2 1/2.
