

JOHNSON MEN WILL FIGHT BRYAN

St. Paul, May 8.—Chairman Day of the Democratic state committee, who is the private secretary of the governor, today ridiculed the threat of the Bryan men to hold a rival convention and send a contesting delegation to Denver. He said that the Bryan men have probably carried but six counties with a total of 59 delegates and that in no event will they have more than 100 of the 835 votes in the state convention. Chairman Day said: "The convention is ours. This talk of contests and a rival convention is simply bluff for the purpose of covering up a failure."
