McFarland's defeat of Cross should not be taken as a surprise. The New Yorker can scarcely be ranked with such fighters as Nelson, Hyland and Nelson. He is a fighter of the former Denver sporting writer, now of New York, who is always fearless and honest in his expressions, has this to say of Cross: "Cross is a staller who keeps covered up all the time and only lashes out with a punch when he feels there is no danger in doing so. Hyland is a fighter every minute of the time he is in the ring. He closed Cross around the ring from going to gong but could not corner the New Yorker because of Cross' spinning abilities. Cross makes no effort to fight more than a minute in each round. The other two minutes he covered his face and stood in the center around the ring. On the other hand, Hyland forced him around the ring every second of every one of the six rounds and hit him against the ropes covering up and in a very bad way at the close. Cross is strong with the fists and shot, but he is not a fighter. He seems to be a crowd drawer, is the only cause for his being pitted against a top-notch fighter."

Now that it is a matter of choice between Hyland and McFarland, with Hyland being the better fighter, it is back himself strong, he should give up a square deal. There are those who have been plugging for others, those who would prefer Hyland to be induced to leave the city, but "Fighting Dick" is determined to stay. He is entirely confident of his ability to stand against Cross was fully as strong as McFarland's. Hyland is just that style of miller who impresses with distance. McFarland has shown himself fast and clever but not as strong and rugged as Hyland. If Hyland and Nelson are matched my money will be on Hyland. Nelson's two victories over the aged and time-slowed Gans, whose courage was not the best variety, does not impress me as showing him invincible.

ATTEMPT TO SECURE PART OF AURORA, ILL. Chicago, Oct. 27.—The owners of property worth, at a conservative estimate, \$2,500,000, and located in the very heart of the business district of Aurora, Ill., have had their holdings placed in jeopardy by the filing of papers in the general land office in Washington laying claim to it.

A syndicate headed by J. M. Spiker of Aurora claims that, through possession of a quantity of United States government scrip issued at the close of the Mexican war, its members are the real owners of the property.

The property to which claim is laid embraces about half the area of Stolps' island in the Fox river, on which are situated the Aurora city hall, the United States postoffice, the Aurora public library, banks, stores, newspaper offices and the plant of the Western Union Co. Gas & Electric company, and also eight blocks on the west side of the city and 14 blocks on the east side of River street. This latter property is all improved and is lined with stores and business blocks.

Former Senator E. Mason of Chicago is acting as counsel for the syndicate. With the exception of Spiker, the names of the members of the syndicate are carefully withheld. It is admitted, however, that several prominent Aurora men and also wealthy Chicagoans are interested and have furnished the money to push the claim.

The first move has been a petition asking the land office to survey the land according to old-time methods—by metes and bounds.

"Should the general land office refuse to make the survey," said former Senator Mason last night, "then a suit will be filed to compel them to do so. Suits in our proceeding will be filed later."

"It is not likely that the city buildings or city property can be affected by the present proceedings. The city, I believe, got title to the land by a special act of Congress."

The news that a large amount of Aurora's best property was in danger, caused consternation in the city when the facts became known last night.

LONE HIGHWAYMAN KIDNAPS WEALTHY MAN Bellingham, Wash., Oct. 27.—A special from Mount Vernon, says: "While driving to Mount Vernon last night from here, Edward English, a wealthy lumberman of Mount Vernon, was held up and kidnaped by a lone robber, about three miles from town. The robber forced English to make a note payable at a Mount Vernon bank for \$5,000 and write the following letter to his wife: "Mrs. English—Dear Wife: I am held up and kidnaped for \$5,000 and I am threatened with having my ears cut off if the money is not paid to me tomorrow night. For God's sake make all haste. Show this to Mr. Hannay and solicit this sum."

"ED ENGLISH." Hannay is connected with a Mount Vernon bank. The robber, within two miles

of town, handed the note and letter to a passing traveler, telling him that English had been injured in a runaway and to take the message to Mrs. English. This the stranger did. Meanwhile the bandit left his victim tied to a tree, evidently intending to return to him in the morning to see if the ransom was forthcoming.

English, however, managed to break loose from the ropes which bound him and made his way to the home of Henry Day, about two miles from Mount Vernon, where he telephoned his wife and Sheriff Harmon of Skagit county. The sheriff at once sent deputies out in hopes of securing the kidnaper. The fellow is described as having one arm bandaged up. It is thought the stranger who brought the note to Mrs. English was a confederate.
