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LEGISLATION IS INSURING DAY

Lawmakers Set Aside the Day To Inspect Agricultural College at Logan.

OLD HANDS ARE IN CHARGE

Crew and Railway Officials Handling The Trip Form a "Bunch Hard to Beat."

With the experienced hand of Engineer C. A. Chasseaie at the throttle on "Old No. 655," the legislative train pulled out of the Oregon Short Line depot at 7:30 o'clock this morning.

The train, consisting of seven cars, baggage, smoker, four coaches and the private car of Gen. Supt. Davis, was packed to the guards with legislators, their wives and sweethearts, newspapermen and their wives and sweethearts, and railroad men, who are not supposed to have any wives and sweethearts.

Assisting Engineer Chasseaie in the cab was Frank M. E. Jacobson, who has experience with special trains has been quite extended. In charge of the train was Conductor E. H. Hawley and brakemen E. E. Mulren and J. E. Phoeney, and their assistants Assistant General Passenger Agent Daniel S. Spencer, and Superintendent A. B. Stevenson of the Utah division of the Oregon Short Line.

The trip to Logan, including a visit to the State Agricultural college, has been a feature of each session of the legislature since the institution of the college in 1884. During the early part of each session a day has been set apart for visiting the college, and the Oregon Short Line has always provided the most comfortable facilities for the biennial trip.

The people of Logan have invariably extended the hand of welcome to the visiting legislators on these occasions, while the college, never surpassed in hospitality and capacity to entertain, has always had something to show the legislators and something to feed them on from its most excellent department of domestic science.

The crowd assembled at the station at 8 o'clock this morning, and everybody was in good humor. As in the sessions of the house itself, the voice of the minority—consisting of Representative Morris and Representative and Representative Hammond of Grand—was apparent. Whatever the minority wants or does not want is always an important consideration with the house, but in this case it is a matter of nominal opposition to state-wide prohibition.

The trip was made without special incident until the train reached Ogden, where a dining car was switched on, and the run north toward Logan was continued.

The only stop of any consequence made after leaving Ogden was at Brigham City, where the train was greeted by an enthusiastic crowd of citizens who hurried to cheer the legislators and gushes of Representative W. S. Hanson.

The crowd all flocked to the left hand side of the train to gaze through the windows at the grandeur of mountain and stream, but the train rounded the curves of the rocky declivities of Bear River canyon, high above the falls and rapids of Bear river, where the feasts of modern travel are displayed in all their glory.

The level stretches of Cache valley soon came into view after crossing the Collinston divide, and the descent into the valley was rapid. The "granary of Utah" soon terminated in the arrival of the legislative train in the "templed city of the north."

COAL PRODUCTION CURTAILED.

Wyoming Operators Say Mild Weather or Has Decreased Demand.

Coal mines in Wyoming are shutting down for want of commercial orders. This is the intelligence received today from the coal fields, and the reason given is that the unusually mild winter has resulted in a largely decreased consumption of coal. It is stated that the bulk of orders is now for railroad use, but in the same breath the information is given that the supplies of the railroads are now almost gone. City coal dealers have not received any notice from the operators of any reduction in price; but under the circumstances there will be expectation on the part of the public of a material reduction. The contrast between present conditions and the unprecedented coal famine of two years ago is somewhat striking.
