## PROF. HENDRICKS GOES TO A.C.

State Board of Education Meets in Logan April 27.

Special Correspondence.

Logan, April 27.—Prof. George R. Hendricks of the Brigham Young college has been engaged in the commercial department of the Agricultural college for next season. Prof. Hendricks is a young man of considerable ability. He was born in Lewiston, Cache county, and graduated with a degree from the school in which he now teaches. He took his master's degree from Harvard and is a highly capable man in his line.

The present holder of the fellowship is Theodore T. Holt of Oregon, who has been giving much attention to the expanding of silver ores, and whose researches are said to add greatly to the knowledge of this subject.

The letter follows:

"Applications are hereby invited by the Utah state school of mines for the award of the Wall research fellowship in mining, ore dressing, or metallurgy, the annual stipend of which is \$500.

"In order to be eligible, the applicant must be a graduate of a college or university of recognized standing (or will be by July 1), and must be qualified to enter upon research work in mining, ore dressing, or metallurgy. During the school year the holder of this fellowship must be a resident student of the University of Utah, devoting about half his time to research work and the remainder to study.

"If not personally known to the committee on awards, the applicant should send testimonials of his character and ability, and also an abstract of his record. The committee will award the fellowship to that young man who seems best qualified to engage in successful research work in one of three subjects named.

"Applications will be received up to May 15, and should be addressed to the Director of the State School of Mines, University of Utah, Salt Lake City.


