soon saw that he was up against the real thing when one of the men threatened to shoot him if he did not comply. As soon as the men were lined up one of the men held the crowd at bay with his revolver while the other hold-up proceeded to rob the fare table and roulette wheel, leaving the cash register untouched. They then backed

out of the saloon, ran down the canyon and into the hills. Both men were clean shaven and light complexioned, this description agreeing with that given of the two men who held up a Murray saloon nearly two months ago. Deputy Sheriff Forbes is at the head of a posse which is in pursuit of the men.
