NEWHOUSE WANTS TO BE SHOWN

Calls for Evidence of Forthcoming Half Million from Ogden For State Capitol.

FRED KIESEL SERIOUSLY ILL.

From Severe Attack of Pneumonia—Resolutions in Honor of Judge Henderson—Runaway.

OGDEN, June 14.—Gentlemen of Ogden: If you will show any evidence that you can raise \$500,000 for the erection of a capitol building, with all my heart and soul, I will do everything in my power to bring the capitol to Ogden.

The above is the statement made yesterday afternoon at the Weber club by Samuel Newhouse of Salt Lake City, when called upon for a statement regarding Ogden's probable chances for the securing of the capitol.

Mr. Newhouse, ex-Senator George W. Baxter of New Jersey and Col. John C. Montgomery of New York were the guests of Mayor A. L. Brewer, Councilman H. E. Peery and H. J. Peery at the Weber club at luncheon.

The guests were in the city investigating their mammoth irrigation project which will be built in Weber canyon.

It was during the luncheon after short addresses by President A. R. Heywood and Mayor Brewer that Mr. Newhouse made the statement in regard to the moving of the state capitol to Ogden.

HONOR OF JUDGE HENDERSON

OGDEN, June 14.—The following resolutions of respect upon the death of Henry Perry Henderson, were presented by Charles C. Richards, and spread upon the records of the Weber county district court on Saturday. The resolutions were previously adopted at a meeting of the Bar association, at which A. R. Heywood presided. Speeches were made by C. C. Richards, Judge Foreman and T. D. Johnson. The resolutions follow:

"Whereas, death has taken from our ranks our friend and brother, the Honorable Henry Perry Henderson, one of the noblest and worthiest members of the bar of this state, and who, at one time, was associate justice of the supreme court of Utah, under appointment by the president, and as such was the presiding judge of this district; and

"Whereas, Judge Henderson was well known in all parts of Utah as an able, honest and sincere man, into whose hands no suit or ever feared to commit his cause and his rights; He could not be swerved from the path of rectitude, either on the bench or at the bar. He was always the firm friend of the right; ever public-spirited, living close to the people and looking to their best interests. He was therefore a citizen in whose death we lose a friend in whom all could confide; and

"Whereas, in the loss of so worthy a man, lawyer and judge, the members of the bar of this county and district desire to publicly express their high appreciation, esteem and respect for him, as well as sympathy for his widow and relatives; therefore it is

"Resolved, by the members of the bar of the Second judicial district of the State of Utah: That we are deeply grieved at the loss of Judge Henry P. Henderson; that we honored and admired him in his lifetime and desire to

OLD FIGHT TO BE ENCORED.

Squabble Between Council, Board of Works and Engineer Due Again.

When the city council meets tonight, P. J. Moran, the official contractor, will be present with his claim against the city for repaying the outlet sewer. It is understood that the bill will amount to about \$20,000, which is about \$10,000 more than the original contract for the pipe. The council will probably attempt to fix the responsibility and the old fight between the council, the board of public works and the city engineer will be renewed again.

The pumps were started again last Thursday on the west side sewer system. City Engineer Kelsey will start to work again cleaning out the sewer and James Kennedy will start this morning on sewer extension 183 in the southwestern part of the city.

The poll tax ordinance will come up for passage tonight. It will probably be approved without any trouble because it conforms with the new law passed by the last legislature. There will probably be some discussion about the permit issued to L. J. Bowers to establish a city market in the old Continental hay market, where farmers may stand their teams and sell their produce.

Councilman Louis D. Martin has again threatened to call up his resolution to suppress gambling at the race track. The "American" party members of the council have agreed to kill it outright.

Chief of Police Sam M. Barlow's recommendation to the council asking for an increase of salary for Mrs. Zella Gifford from \$25.50 a month to \$40 a month will be considered.

BACCALAUREATE TO YOUNG GRADUATES

The Rev. L. L. Dubois Tells Them How to Reach the True Goal.

The Baccalaureate sermon at All Hallows college was delivered yesterday morning by the Rev. L. L. Dubois, in which he said:

"How many young men have left college with the idea that at last restraint was removed, and that they were going to enjoy themselves. That was their ideal. The enjoyment was of short duration; they made the discovery that pleasure and self-indulgence are in no way synonyms of happiness, that a merry evening brings a sad morning; and that the cup of pleasure, however sweet it may appear at first, leaves behind it only bitterness and regret.

"Be on your guard against companions who have no other standard than the most fun with the least work. Before you become too friendly with anyone, find out, as you say so well, 'what kind of a fellow he is.' If his ideas in life run low, if he has little or no ambition, beware of him; if his thoughts and conversations do not rise higher than money, dress, society and amusements, he can do little for you; and the chances are that you can do little for him, except through your good example. Do not class yourself with him. In deciding the ambitious and the successful, the honest and the pure-minded, the virtuous and the religious, you can not afford to class yourself with him.

"It is the beginning of a sad tragedy when a young man just out of college enters a set of a lower moral tone than his own. The set that drinks a little and gambles a little; the set that wants at all cost to be amused; the set that has to be provided with some sensational pastime every 24 hours. Remember that you can not meet with such company without injury to yourselves, to your moral fiber, to your standing in life, to your eternal welfare.

"Beware of beginnings. You know that at a railroad switch, if the car is in the wrong position when the original position they are thrown into a very different direction. Upon this slight change depends the rest of the journey. So it is in our life, when the sad opportunity of leaving the right way is in your hands, do not say to yourselves, 'what is the harm, but rather, what is the best road now open to me, what is the best ideal I can work for.'
