

PEARY FREE WITH COOK'S SUPPLIES

Assumed the Doctor Was Dead And Put His Own Boatswain in Charge of Them.

DANISH PHYSICIAN'S STORY.

Peary's Man Acted as Though He Owned Everything and Used All For His Own Benefit.

Copenhagen, Sept. 12.—A remarkable letter, giving Dr. Frederick A. Cook's version of the trouble with Commander Peary over supplies, appears in the Politiken. The letter was written by Dr. Norman Hansen, a prominent Danish physician, who several times visited Greenland to study eye diseases.

Dr. Cook told practically the same story to one of his closest American friends just a week ago, before Commander Peary's departure on the scene, but said he did not intend to make it public because it might lead to unpleasantness.

Dr. Hansen was with Dr. Cook for some time in Greenland and returned with him on the Danish steamer Hans Egede.

DR. HANSEN'S STORY.

"Now that Dr. Cook has gone," he writes, "I am no longer under any obligations to keep silent, and will exercise my right to publish the story about the house in Anaktuok, a story which Dr. Cook himself had too much delicacy to relate to the world. I write it from memory, as Dr. Cook told it to me, and I am fully convinced that in no details are my recollections wrong."

"Dr. Cook had built his house for stores in Anaktuok, north of Etah, and it was this depot which he started to reach in February, 1902, crossing Smith Sound. It was a pretty large house, the walls being built of heavily-filled provision boxes so that Dr. Cook could take them with him when he went to the north in the winter of 1908-1909.

"When Dr. Cook and his two Eskimos, exhausted and half-starved, came within a short distance of the house in Anaktuok, young Whitney came out to bid him welcome, but inside the house was a stranger, a giant Newfoundland boatswain on watch. This man had been placed in Dr. Cook's house by Peary, when the latter passed Etah with his ship bound north. Peary had given the boatswain a written order, which commenced with the following words:

"This house belongs to Dr. Frederick

lick A. Cook, but Dr. Cook is long ago dead and there is no use to search for him. Therefore, I, Commander Robert E. Peary, install my boatswain in this deserted house."

"This man, the boatswain, who could neither read nor write, exhibited to Dr. Cook and the latter took a copy.

"This copy, however, he does not intend to publish if Peary's course does not force him to do so. Dr. Cook gave me a lively account of how the young millionaire Whitney, during the whole winter, was treated like a dog by the boatswain and how he had witnessed the sailor harrying Dr. Cook's provisions for fox and bear skins for himself. Dr. Cook also had to put a good face on the unpleasant situation. He had to beg to get into his own house and had to make a compromise with the boatswain.

"Dr. Cook made a present of the house with all of its contents to his two faithful Eskimos, with the proviso that Whitney was to have the use of the house as long as his hunting trip lasted, but he was compelled to let the boatswain continue his watch. The boatswain, however, received strict orders not to exchange any more of the provisions or guns.

"To Mr. Whitney Dr. Cook gave his instructions and his observations, as he thought these precious things were safer there than on the long sledging trip in the spring across Melville bay, but all his notebooks and soiled record books, which have been so closely written upon, he kept and carried with him.

"To men who understand only very little astronomy the record written down so closely and in all directions was very hard to read, but what is the record to us? The two men, Peary and Cook, their character, their conduct, that is what interests us, and every little item throwing a sidelight upon their nature is valuable."

LONDON PAPERS FOR PEARY.

London, Sept. 12.—The London

newspapers now appear content to speak for themselves.

The London Post, however, in a special article today, compares the accounts of Dr. Cook and Commander Peary, and says that the latter's tale is a plain, unvarnished tale, bearing the impress of genuineness, and carrying conviction. The writer thinks Peary's dropping the white man in the last stage of his journey was due partly to the lack of food, and partly to a desperate effort unhampered by a large party, and partly through reluctance to share his triumph with any other white man.

The Post points out that whereas Commander Peary had independent witnesses on his journey to nearly the eighty-eighth parallel, Dr. Cook's only white companion, the Eskimo, setting aside the unimpaired speed of the journey, the Post supposes that it was due to superior organization and equipment.

ADVICE FROM BERLIN.

Berlin, Sept. 12.—The Frankfort Zeitung says in regard to the north pole controversy, that only statements setting out the facts, and not the materials before them, can give an authoritative decision in regard to the controversy between Dr. Cook and Commander Peary.

CANADA CLAIMS ALL.

Ottawa, Sept. 12.—Canada claims all the land directly north of the American continent, and the pole is at a point on which it would be possible to nail a flag.

"This position will be taken, it was semi-officially stated today, in reply to a question asked in the British house of commons as to the ownership of the north pole, soon after the result of Dr. Cook's and Commander Peary's expedition, having all the time. The question was referred to Canada for reply.

Canada's answer, in effect, will be that all the territory between the northern boundary and the pole has been recognized as Canada's hinterlands. The islands have been formally taken possession of by Captain Brienreid, Canada's arctic explorer, who is now lost in the post.

SUGGESTION FROM FRANCE.

Paris, Sept. 12.—French scientists are beginning to distinctly favor the submission by Dr. Cook and Commander Peary of their records to an impartial international scientific tribunal. Prince Roland Bonaparte, president of the Paris Geographical society, believes that France is the logical holder of the pole. "Records are inconclusive," he said today. "They contain plenty of literature effect but scant detail, and they lack exact information. Personally, I think that both Commander Peary and Dr. Cook should be asked to produce their proofs, maps and diaries."

"Until that is done, the scientific world has the right to entertain the doubt. It does not imply distrust, but it is proper that a demonstration should be given. It is possible that both Dr. Cook and Commander Peary reached the pole, but why one rather than the other? I think all documents should be submitted to a scientific society which would name a commission composed of explorers, astronomers, navigators and polar experts. Every document should be produced in order that the conclusion may be definite. The commission should have the right to summon witnesses and cross-examine them.

"In the United States the scientists, according to their sympathies, are divided into Cookites and Pearyites. Therefore an American verdict would convince no one. England should also be excited as an arbitrator, as the two countries are bound by ties of blood. Besides the English countrymen have displayed some jealousy."

Conspirators Against Lincoln. Washington, Sept. 12.—Judge Martin F. Morris, former chief justice of the court of appeals of the District of Columbia, died today aged 74 years. Judge Morris defended John H. Surrat, one of the alleged conspirators against President Lincoln.

DROWNED TRYING TO RESCUE OTHERS

Ocean Park, Cal., Sept. 12.—While trying to rescue one of two young women who had fallen off a diving raft on which they were sporting themselves just beyond the breaker line, James T. Cleary, a young attorney who came from Grand Island, Neb., was

drowned yesterday. James Irwin, his companion, and the two girls, Misses Adelaide and Julia Smith, were saved by other bathers who rescued them from the tide rip.

Cleary has been practicing in Los Angeles since his graduation from Georgetown university about three ago. His brother is a district attorney in Nebraska. The body has not been recovered.

IMMIGRANTS BETTER AMERICANS THAN AMERICANS

Chicago, Sept. 12.—The immigrant is a better American than the American himself. He has learned by experience in his native land to appreciate the freedom and advantages of the United States. He can understand the free life which the American takes merely as an individual.

Dr. David Blaustein, superintendent of the Chicago Hebrew institute, speaking on American and the immigrant, thus expressed himself yesterday at a meeting of the Chicago circle of the Butcherly association. His opinion has the weight of years of contact with the immigrant problem in New York.

"The immigrant comes to this country from a land of despotism and oppression, and finds America willing to allow him to include a broad view, freedom—in short, new life," said Dr. Blaustein. "He is the dreamer, the idealist and loves America by contrast. He is anxious to develop and adopt the American customs, traditions and spirit with an eagerness that is absolutely wanting in the American native, who looks on these privileges as his natural right."

NEW YORK POLICE FEAR A TONG WAR

New York, Sept. 12.—Fearing that another tong war is about to break out in Chinatown, scores of additional policemen have been assigned to that small district so that now there is an officer, either a patrolman or a detective, every few feet. The shooting of Kee Gung, a Hip Sing tong leader, by Leo Wah, of the On Leong tong, is believed to have shattered the peace agreement which these oriental secret societies entered into some time ago.

The shooting of Kee Gung followed the indictment of four On Leong members a few days ago on charges of complicity in the murder of Bow Kum, a Chinese slave girl who was found stabbed to death in her room on Aug. 15. The Hip Sing were accused of having furnished the testimony. There has been an air of uneasiness in Chinatown, since the murder of the young girl, and the police say that members of the rival tongs have been arming themselves. Following the shooting last night, the police have been on duty before daylight today and report that they confiscated a quantity of fire arms. All residents of Chinatown have been warned by the police to remain in their homes, while a systematic search of the locality is being made for weapons.

IN JEWISH CALENDAR YEAR 5-670 BEGINS WEDNESDAY

Chicago, Sept. 12.—The year 5670 will begin Wednesday, according to the Jewish calendar. New Year's day, probably Rosh Hashonah, will arrive with Sept. 15.

The year 5670 anno mundi will be the eighth of the two hundred and ninety-ninth lunar cycle of 19 years since the creation, according to the Jewish reckoning, and it is the fourteenth year of the two hundred and third solar cycle of 28 years, also counting from creation. The next stage in the marking of time will be the night, while a systematic survey of the equinoxes in spring and autumn when day and night were exactly of the same length. This would give five months of 29 days each.
