

LIEUT. SUTTON'S BODY EXHUMED

Autopsy Disclosed No Bones Were Broken, Although Was a Contusion Over the Right Eye.

BULLET WOUND CLEAN CUT.

Remains Placed in New Coffin and Reinterred After Ground Had Been Consecrated.

Washington, Sept. 13.—After the body of Lieut. James N. Sutton, Jr., the marine officer, who met his death about two years ago at Annapolis, was exhumed at Arlington cemetery today, an autopsy disclosed the fact that no bones were broken, although a contusion was found over the right eye.

Mrs. Sutton has contended that her son's arm had been broken in the fight which preceded his death, and that this being the case, the shot which ended his life could not have been self-inflicted.

Dr. George Tully Vaughan of this city, who represented Mrs. Sutton at the autopsy, said tonight that the bullet wound which caused his death was three inches above the right ear and was clean cut.

There was no indication that the hair and scalp had been burned by powder. Surgeon Spear, who represented the navy department, declined to make a statement, saying he would report directly to the department.

Mr. Van Dyke, associate counsel for Mrs. Sutton, said he was convinced that the shot had been fired at least five feet from the officer's head, and the wound showed conclusively that it was a physical impossibility for Sutton to have fired the shot.

Dr. Vaughan said tonight: "I found the body in a fair state of preservation, except a softening of the chest, trunk and arms. I found no bones broken. There was a contusion or bruise over the right eye, about two and a half inches by one and a half inches. The bullet wound in the scalp was three inches above the right ear. There was no sign of burning of the hair. There were two or three cuts in connection with the bullet wound; one in the scalp near the bullet hole, and by the other about the middle of the scalp. This last cut may have been made at the post-mortem, or by a blunt instrument before death."

Present at the grave when the body was disinterred were Mrs. Sutton, several friends, her attorneys, several surgeons and a number of newspapermen. Mrs. Sutton was the first person to look

upon the face of her dead son. After leaving the storeroom where the body lay, she said:

"I want you newspapermen to go in there and see for yourselves that the forehead is crushed."

After viewing the body the newspapermen were excluded from the room and the surgeons commenced the autopsy. The examination was made by Drs. George T. Vaughan and H. D. Taylor, representing Mrs. Sutton, and Dr. Raymond Spear, U. S. N., representing the navy department.

CAPE THOMAS PHELAN DEAD.

Bremerton, Wash., Sept. 14.—Capt. Thomas Phelan of Kansas City, soldier of fortune, died yesterday in Bremerton, aged 73 years. While visiting in his native country, Ireland, many years ago Phelan learned of a plot to blow up the British ship Queen and warned officers of the navy.

Following the exposure of this plot, Phelan was requested to call at the office of O'Donovan Rossa, editor of the Irishman in New York. While in the office Phelan was stabbed 12 times and his arm was broken, but he recovered.

ELLA FLAGG YOUNG WILL NOT REPEND

Banquet to be Given Prest. Taft By Chicago Commercial Club Thursday.

WAS ONLY WOMAN INVITED.

"It is a Man's Organization Entertaining a Man, and I Am Not Going To Thrust Myself In."

Chicago, Sept. 14.—Just as many women suffragists in various parts of the country had become elated over the fact that Mrs. Ella Flagg Young, superintendent of the Chicago public schools, had been invited as the only woman guest to sit at the banquet to be given to President Taft on Thursday, by the Commercial club, Mrs. Young cooled any expectations that she would by actions champion the right of women to sit in the high councils of men by announcing that she would not attend the dinner.

In her official capacity, as head of the school system, Mrs. Young received one of the invitations to the Commercial club dinner to the president, and found herself the one feminine representative in a list of guests that included the mayor of the city, the governor of the state, federal judges, gray haired senators, the speaker of the house of representatives and the president of the United States.

"We congratulate you," suffragists from various parts of the country have been writing to Mrs. Young. "It will be a great day for the American woman."

"I am not going," Mrs. Young wrote back. "It is a man's organization entertaining a man, and I am not going to thrust myself in. They'll want to smoke."

Mrs. Young says she is a suffragette but on account of her official position is not one in practice.

MINISTERS CONDEMN JUDGE.

For Sentencing Murderer to be Executed Monday Instead of Friday.

Omaha, Neb., Sept. 14.—Because Judge Sutton of the Douglas county district court departed from the old custom of Friday as a date for executions, in sentencing John Masourides, murderer of a South Omaha police officer, to be hanged on a Monday, the Omaha Ministerial union yesterday adopted resolutions commending the judge. Speaking of fixing the date for the execution on Monday instead of Friday, Judge Sutton said:

"The execution of murderers on Friday always has been abhorrent to me. It is a custom dating back into antiquity and nothing less than a mockery of the crucifixion of Christ. Although this may be sentiment, it seems to me, with five other days in the week in which to vindicate law and justice there is no necessity of confining an execution to the day upon which the Saviour gave up his life."

Never before, so far as is known, has a man been sentenced in Nebraska to be hanged on any other day than Friday.

PELLAGRA IS SPREADING.

Durham, N. C., Sept. 14.—Pellagra is spreading in this state at an alarming rate. The ninth death in this locality occurred here last night, two new cases were discovered yesterday, and two of the survivors of the 11 originally afflicted likely will die within a week.

There are said to be 1,000 cases of the disease in North Carolina and but one county, it is declared, is without a patient.

The first autopsy upon a pellagra victim in North Carolina was performed last night on George Moberg, a negro, who had just died violently insane. Though the germ was found, no other trace of the disease was discovered.

The heart and other organs were in perfect condition. Prior to his death, guinea pigs were inoculated with his blood. They have shown no signs of the disease.

RAILROAD EARNINGS FOR YEAR \$2,437,385,841

Chicago, Sept. 14.—The gross earnings of the railroads of the United States for the year ending June 30, 1909, were \$2,437,385,841, according to the figures compiled by the bureau of railway news and statistics from the monthly reports of the interstate commerce commission as given out here yesterday. Last operating expenses were \$1,511,927,264; taxes \$8,381,475; and net operating income, \$736,496,600.

DISS DE BAR'S CUP-BEARER IS ORDERED DEPORTED

New York, Sept. 14.—David Livingston Mackay cup-bearer and secretary of Mme. Diss de Bar, who was arrested and taken to Ellis Island by immigration authorities a few days ago, had a hearing yesterday and at its conclusion an order was issued for his deportation. He will be sent to Canada. Mackay admitted he has been convicted in Bristol, Canada, in 1897, of having sold improper literature over the counter of a grocery which he was running in that city. He said he had served four months in preference to paying a fine of \$100. He is an Englishman by birth and citizenship.
