BANK OF ENGLAND RAISES DISCOUNT

Cause is Large Inroads on Its Reserve Made by Exports of Gold to Egypt for Cotton.

RUSSIA IMPORTANT FACTOR.

Absorbing All Available Quantities—Increased Rate Had Little Effect on Stock Exchange.

London, Oct. 7.—The governors of the Bank of England today raised the minimum discount rate from 2 1/2 to 3 per cent. This is the first change since April 1st, when it was reduced from 3 per cent to 2 1/2 per cent owing to the large inroads on the bank's reserve already made by exports to Egypt for the financing of the cotton crop and by Argentine wheat exports.

BULLION WITHDRAWN.

London, Oct. 4.—Bullion amounting to £2,000,000 was withdrawn from the Bank of England today for shipment to Constantinople.

DELAVAN SMITH CASE SET FOR MONDAY

Indianapolis, Ind., Oct. 7.—The preliminary hearing of Delavan Smith and Charles R. Williams, proprietors of the Indianapolis News, charged with having committed criminal libel in publishing articles in that paper which there was corruption in the purchase of the United States of the Panama canal, is set for next Monday in the United States court of this district. It is understood that Smith and Williams are being held in lieu of \$10,000 bail.

TRYING TO PREVENT AUTOMOBILE HOLD-UPS

Chicago, Oct. 7.—Chief of Police Brown is making an effort to stop automobile hold-ups. In yesterday's issue of the Bulletin, the chief issued this order to be printed: "Stop these automobile robberies. In the last few weeks several automobile hold-ups have been held up and the robbers have been escaping. These robberies are becoming more frequent and you will make a big mistake if you do not stop them. APPEAL FOR FUNDS FOR IRISH CAUSE

T. P. O'Connor, M. P. Coming To Explain Political Situation And Ask Financial Aid.

GREAT CRISIS HAS ARISEN.

House of Lords Trying to Kill Land Bill That Promises to Close the Land War of Centuries.

London, Oct. 7.—T. P. O'Connor, M. P. will sail shortly for the United States at the request of John E. Redmond, the Irish leader, to explain the political situation in America and to appeal for funds to carry on the struggle for home rule. The Nationalists regard the approaching elections as one of the most critical periods in their history and the full power of their organization will be utilized in helping the Liberals to deprive the house of lords of the power of veto which they claim, is the sole remaining obstacle to home rule.

DID SON COMMIT PERJURY TO SAVE HIS MOTHER?

Sydney, Neb., Oct. 7.—Anton Krupnick was a wealthy farmer living a few miles from Sydney. On the night of June 29, he arose from his bed, got into his kitchen, and while sitting there a bullet from a rifle was fired into his right temple, producing almost instant death.

INTERSTATE COMMERCE COMMISSION HEARINGS

Seattle, Wash., Oct. 7.—For the first time on the Pacific coast the full membership of the interstate commerce commission began hearings in Seattle today. The case is known as the Seattle chamber of commerce, transportation bureau and the Tacoma Traffic association against the Northern Pacific railway and others.

"DOWN WITH AUSTRIA"

Belgrade, Serbia, Oct. 7.—All the shops of Belgrade are closed today and the public buildings of the city are draped in black to mark the first anniversary of the annexation of the province of Bosnia and Herzegovina by Austria-Hungary. Serbian students are parading the streets shouting: "Down with Austria."

SPANISH TROOPS FORTIFYING.

Melilla, Morocco, Oct. 7.—The Spanish troops are today engaged in fortifying the city and the barracks. Block-houses are being erected, guns of large caliber installed and a railroad built between the two towns.

ENID BANKS WILL PAY GUARANTEE ASSESSMENTS

Enid, Okla., Oct. 7.—After a thorough consideration of the matter, representatives of each of Enid's five state banks announced that the draft of the state banking board assessing three-fourths of 1 per cent on average deposits for the purpose of creating a guarantee fund would be paid on presentation.

New York, Oct. 7.—Reports just received in this country from Bergen, Norway, declare that the second international scientific leprosy congress, recently held there, decided that John Early, who after being pronounced a leper by the Washington authorities, was recently discharged from the Skin and Cancer hospital here on the ground that he was not afflicted with leprosy, actually is a leper.

SPAIN'S PURPOSE IN MOROCCO UNCHANGED

Paris, Oct. 7.—The Spanish ambassador to France, the Marquis de Maut, has again formally assured Foreign Minister Pichon that Spain has no intention of departing from her original program regarding Morocco as communicated to the powers.

REORGANIZATION OF FINNISH SENATE

St. Petersburg, Oct. 7.—It is reported here from Helsinki that the government of Finland is planning to reorganize a senate from the Finns now in the Russian military service to replace the senators who last month notified that they would not accept reappointment to office because the Russian cabinet insisted that the Finnish senate assign \$4,000,000 as Finland's contribution for the defense of the empire.

Nashville, Tenn., Oct. 7.—It was announced here today that near beer dealers are liable for a tax of \$1,500 a year each, the state, the county and the city, each being entitled to \$500.
