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ALREADY DIGGING AFTER THE MONEY

"Americans" Make Early Preparations to Raid the City Treasurer for Salaries.

ALL WANT TO PARTICIPATE.

Police, Firemen, Various Deputies And Appointees in All Branches May Land an Extra Feather for Nests.

When the new "American" administration takes hold of the city's affairs at the beginning of the year, an increase of salaries amounting to \$50,000 a year will be made among firemen and patrolmen and some of the other officials.

This was decided upon Saturday at a caucus of the "American" members of the city council and the officials, held in Mayor John S. Bransford's office.

Councilman Black will introduce the ordinance in relation to the police department and L. D. Martin the ordinance increasing the salaries in the fire department.

Both Black and Martin retire from the council on the first of the year and no blame can be attached to the new members for the increase.

The ordinance will probably be passed some time in December and will take effect on the first of the year.

The scale of increases in the police department will be as follows: Patrolmen, from \$85 to \$100 a month; mounted officers, from \$100 to \$115; sergeants of police, from \$110 to \$125; lieutenants, from \$125 to \$140; secretaries of the department, from \$75 to \$100; matron, from \$40 to \$50.

New patrolmen will be required to work the first six months for \$85 a month, the second six months for \$90, and after that they will receive \$100 a month.

The proposed increases in the salaries of the members of the fire department are as follows: Firemen, from \$85 to \$100 a month; lieutenants, from \$90 to \$105; captains, from \$110 to \$125; engineers, from \$125 to \$140; secretary of the department, from \$90 to \$105; superintendent of alarms, from \$100 to \$115; assistant chief, from \$120 to \$135; chief of department, from \$175 to \$200.

The salaries paid out this year by the city administration will amount to approximately \$380,000 which is more than half of the amount collected for taxes.

The proposed increase for next year will send the salary list above the \$400,000 mark, which will equal two-thirds of the tax levy.

Chief of Police Hunting—Not for Thugs, But Ducks

While the city was being terrorized by holdups who committed the most daring crimes of that class in the open, the latter part of last week, Chief of Police Barlow was off duck hunting.

Of course, this fact did not affect the chances of the police catching the criminals, because Barlow does not catch criminals. Every man on the force knows that Barlow is a "filler," that he holds his job through political pull. But this does not matter. The real chief of police is George Sheets, who wears the title of chief of detectives, an office created especially for his benefit following the time of his "resignation" as chief of police because of the McWhirter poker robbery scandal.

The Schwamm-Johnson drug store No. 2 was held up under the glare of two powerful arc lights—and Sam Barlow went duck hunting.

The crew of a Wandanere street car was held up—and Sam Barlow went duck hunting.

The same night, the same men burglarized Hassard's store directly opposite the park—and Sam Barlow went duck hunting.

The same night, the same men stole a valuable horse from the Granite Livery and Feed stable, at Fourteenth South and State streets—and Sam Barlow went duck hunting.

The fact that Barlow's absence does not materially affect the efficiency of the police force is well understood. But Barlow insists on reducing the force by taking mounted patrolmen with him. On his last excursion Monday, Policeman Horace M. Heath was taken along.

Barlow has been howling that the police force is too small, and that he needed more men. He always puts this up as an excuse for not capturing the criminals that have held Salt Lake in a reign of terror. Then he goes off duck hunting, and takes mounted patrolmen with him, when the force needs every available man in searching for two holdups that have committed three daring crimes in one night.

Regarding this matter, the "American" party organ states that "Chief Barlow and the others arrived in the city from the long trip."

One of the interesting elements of this state of affairs at the police station is the fact that Barlow was away duck hunting, and yet the "American" party organ, though admitting that he was away on a "long trip" and did not return until last Friday night, claims that Barlow thoroughly investigated the death of Ernest E. Goring, whose son, Edmund F. Goring, swears that he was "roughed" by a mob of 25 and foully murdered in the Crescent rooming house. As a matter of fact, Barlow never looked into this case at all until last Saturday, although the alleged crime occurred the night of the preceding Monday.

The "American" party organ, which devotes columns to the daily defense of George Barlow and his incompetent administration as chief of police, does not explain how Barlow could go duck hunting, and take a "long trip" and yet conduct a thorough investigation into a murder case at the same time.

WILL ATTEND INSTITUTE.

Governor Spry and Other Prominent Men to Go to St. George.

Gov. William Spry, A. C. Nelson, superintendent of public instruction, and Congressman Joseph Howell will leave Wednesday for St. George, Washington county, to attend the first Farmers' Institute to be held this year.

Prof. L. A. Merrill, director of the institute; Prof. John T. Caine, Miss Hazel Love, Prof. George H. Turpin and Frank L. Haden from the Agricultural college of Logan passed through Salt Lake Saturday night on their way to the institute.

The institute will continue through the week. Addresses will be made on the most improved methods of scientific farming, domestic science, stock raising and kindred subjects. It is estimated that last year 30,000 people attended these institutes which were held throughout the state and that they resulted in great good. The party will attend institutes in Fillmore, Beaver city and Nephi before returning.

CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

Increase in Salaries Provided for in Ordinances Which May Come Up.

When the city council meets tonight it is probable that several ordinances will be presented increasing salaries of the policemen, firemen and other officials in order to keep election pledges.

Councilmen T. R. Black and L. D. Martin, who retire from the council at the end of the year, will probably introduce the ordinances. The increase in salaries proposed in these ordinances will amount to about \$50,000 a year.

Three contracts will in all probability be approved tonight which have been awarded by the board of public works. The contracts aggregate \$300,000. One is the paving of east Third South street and the other two are sewer extensions in the north and northwestern part of the city.

It is probable that City Engineer Chaney will submit an estimate of the cost of the paving of Second South street from Tenth East to Twelfth East streets.

The council will appropriate \$2,478.19 for interest on sewer script in extensions 187, 185 and 178. Besides this the council has considerable routine matter to dispose of at the session tonight.

NEW CHAPEL OPENED. Edifice at Gardfield Used Yesterday for First Church Service. The latter-day Saints' new meeting-house at Gardfield, erected at a cost of upward of \$2,000, was formally opened Sunday with services in the morning and in the afternoon. President William McLachlan of the Pioneer strike, accompanied by other officials and scores of others were in attendance. The morning session was devoted to Sunday school work and was presided over by Capt. C. C. Nelson. There were about 50 pupils present. It was intended to organize the school Sunday, but the matter will be delayed until all the teachers have been appointed. At the afternoon services the speaker was President McLachlan, Alexander Buchanan, Jr., and H. Charles Hyde. A great many church members reside at Gardfield and as they had no meeting-house they decided to build one. Money was contributed from the various wards of the stake and \$1,000 was given by the Church. There is still some indebtedness on the building and when this is paid the house will be dedicated.
