

HAYS WIFE IS NAUGHTY WOMAN Smokes and Drinks and Allows Daughters to Follow Her Example.

ASKS DECREE OF DIVORCE. He Also Seeks Custody of His Children, Believing He Can Mould Their Conduct Better.

Pauline Baker, the mother of three children, smokes cigarettes, drinks and allows her two daughters to follow her example, according to a complaint for divorce filed Tuesday afternoon by J. A. Baker, a railroad man. Within the last six months Mrs. Baker has borrowed about \$400 in his name and without his consent, he says. Some of the money, he declares, was spent for low rent houses, which she runs up in her name, and for her daughter, Rene, living rooming, he declares. Joined together, she says, she has run up a bill for about \$1000. Mrs. Baker is a well known as the "Belle Amusement company," she sings in moving picture shows. She sings in 10 years old and refuses to go to school. Baker says that he has a complaint, Baker says that he wants the custody of his daughter Nina, 14 years old, and Roy, 4 years old, saying that he believes that he can mold them and get them to attend school.

Martin Jelich, an Austrian, was convicted by a jury yesterday in Judge Thomas D. Lewis's court on the charge of assault with a deadly weapon with intent to do bodily harm. Sentence was postponed in his case until Dec. 13, when a motion for a new trial will be argued. In the district court, Jelich was charged with having stabbed Joseph Bosovich with a knife in Midvale on Aug. 17, 1909.

LEMON SUITS WITHDRAWN.

California Courts Claim Exclusive Jurisdiction and Cases Go There.

The holding of a California court in regard to jurisdiction caused the withdrawal Tuesday in the federal court of the cases of the Union Pacific of California against the Union Pacific railroad company and all other transcontinental lines restraining them from raising the rates on lemons and other fruits which were to have gone into effect shortly. The last Congress raised the duty on lemons and kindred fruits in order to enable the California growers to compete with importers of Italy and Spain. Of all the lemons used in this country but 40 per cent were contributed by local growers, the majority coming from abroad. It was for the purpose of enabling the American growers to dispose of their product and increase their arduousness that the duty was raised.

MELLEN WANTS MONEY.

Fits Suit Against Board of Education For \$2,148.45.

J. W. Mellen, a contractor, filed suit in the Third district court Tuesday against the Board of Education, claiming the fidelity trust & deposit Co., of Maryland, and the board of education to recover \$2,148.45 alleged to be due Mellen for excavating and materials furnished in the construction of the new Jefferson school building.

JUDGMENT IS AFFIRMED.

Majority Opinion of Supreme Court Sustains Lower Court in Title Case.

In the case of William J. Barrette, appellant, against S. A. Whitney, respondent, Justice J. E. Frick of the supreme court handed down a decision yesterday which was concurred in by Justice W. H. McCarty, affirming the judgment of the lower court in dismissing the action against Mr. Whitney. Justice D. N. Straup handed down a dissenting opinion, in which he declared that the court erred, and that the agreement between them was violated.

MAYOR BRANSFORD TALKS.

Mayor Bransford, accompanied by city officials, arrived at the Auditorium about 8 o'clock Tuesday evening, and after being escorted through the building and examining the exhibits, he was taken to the stand by President Price and Manager A. A. Tremp. In his address, he said: "We have allowed our frontiers to be overrun by the great modern army of disbelievers. What the worker—and everyone who is a Christian should be a worker—most needs is forever to keep before his mind the pettiness of mere controversy and the greatness of the whole. We can carry this idea into all work, whether it be that of a girl's club, a mother's meeting, a mission, a heaver of wood, or any human occupation. AFTER LIQUOR MEN.

Chief Special Agent W. E. Johnson of the Indian service has gone back to Minnesota and Wisconsin to "make things warm" for the liquor men who have been running saloons in the territory included within the treaty with the native Indian tribes. Now that the United States court has interpreted the language of the treaty adversely to the liquor interests, Agent Johnson has a clear field. The saloon men were proposing to subscribe a fund for appealing the case to the U. S. circuit court of appeals; but they seem to have been seized with "cold feet," and nothing is doing in that line. The government officers will do their best to close up every saloon within treaty jurisdiction, which takes in most of the states of Minnesota and Wisconsin. During October, Agent Johnson brought 97 complaints against the saloon men, with 186 arrests, 187 indictments and 94 convictions.
