SESSION OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Bond Proposition Up for Consideration but Deferred for Further Investigation.

(Special Correspondence.)
PROVO, March 30.—An order calling a special election for voting on the question of issuing waterworks and electric light bonds was read before the city council last evening. Final action was deferred pending some investigations to be made by the committee on waterworks and the committee on electric light.

An ordinance was passed segregating the office of assessor of weights and measures from that of provision inspector. The compensation of each was fixed at \$50 per annum.
An invitation from the women's club of the city was extended to the council to attend a meeting at the library lecture room Wednesday evening, March 30, to consider the matter of a free public gymnasium and public play grounds. The sense of the meeting was that all who possibly could do so would attend.

A petition was presented asking for the city water mains to be extended between Fifth and Sixth East on Fifth South street. Referred to the committee on waterworks.

C. M. LEEDOM IS DEAD.

OGDEN, March 30.—C. M. Leedom, proprietor of the Falstaff cafe for about 12 years, succumbed to pneumonia at 10 o'clock this morning after a brief illness of one week. He was born in Kansas 48 years ago. He is survived by his wife, who lives here, and his mother, brothers and other relatives in Kansas.

WORK BEGUN ON GRADE FOR CAR LINE TO BRIGHAM

OGDEN, March 30.—Work began this morning on the grade for the Rapid Transit line to Brigham city. Fourteen miles of grade will have to be made north to the Boxelder capital from the present terminus of the line at the Utah Hot springs, where men and teams began operations this morning.

EUREKA.

ELKS' NEW CLUB HOUSE DEDICATED WITH ECLAT

EUREKA, March 30.—The arrival here Tuesday evening of a special train from Salt Lake over the Salt Lake Route, bearing a big delegation of Elks to attend the dedication of the new club-house of the Eureka lodge, was announced by the blowing of whistles at the mines and mills, and the thunder of several charges of dynamite.
Elks owned the town and nothing was too good for them. It was a continuous round of pleasure from the moment the antlered herd arrived until the special pulled out for Salt Lake early this morning with its load of tired but happy wearers of purple.

The dedication of the handsome new \$75,000 clubhouse was an occasion that will remain long in the memory of those who were fortunate enough to attend the same. The city was beautifully decorated with purple and white and bands were here to furnish music. At the depot a parade was formed with Parley P. Christensen and Col. C. L. Applegate in the lead.
The dedication was conducted by Exalted Ruler J. A. Hensel and members of Eureka lodge No. 711. An interesting feature was an eloquent address by Exalted Ruler James W. Collins of Salt Lake No. 83. Mr. Collins is the youngest exalted ruler in the world and is known from coast to coast as Utah's "Boy Exalted Ruler." After the services there was dancing, Col. and Mrs. C. L. Applegate leading the grand march. This was followed by a banquet.

CACHE COUNTY AFFAIRS—HOTEL SOLD FOR TAXES

(Special Correspondence.)
LOGAN, March 29.—The county commissioners were in session here today and among other matters that came before them was that of assisting the state game warden in planting the fish fry which has been apportioned to this county. Heretofore the fry has been placed in small springs by the river side and which were generally filled with larger fish, the result being that most of the fry was destroyed. The state warden asked for an appropriation with which to drain the De Witt springs in Logan canyon so as to rid it of big fish and then to screen it so as to protect the fry placed there. The board appropriated \$300 so as to provide proper planting places in some of the other big streams of the county, where fry is usually planted.
The Eagle Hotel block was ordered conveyed by tax sale deed to the Ogden Savings bank which purchased the property at a tax sale in 1906, and there has been no effort to redeem it since then. The property is located on north Main street and has upon it the largest hotel in the county.
Manager Bacon of the Telluride Power company asked the board for a franchise for a pole line from this city to the town of Providence, in order to
