Tourists in Town—There are 100 Raymond-Whitcomb tourists at the Knutsford for the day, on route east over the Rio Grande.

More Poles Comed Down—The Bell Telephone Company is removing the poles from the center of the street on First South street west of Main.

Engineer Breaks Ankles—W. H. Carter, a high engineer, was injured, fracturing his ankle Tuesday night, at Midvale, by a fall in his cab. He is at St. Mark's hospital.
