

PITTSBURG GRAFT CASE EVIDENCE

District Attorney and Staff Very Busy Presenting Last of It to The Grand Jury.

EXTRADITION OF HOFFSTOT.

It Will Be Asked for and if Refused He May Be Tried in New York.

Pittsburg, April 7.—The district attorney and his staff were busy today with the grand jury, presenting what is believed to be the last evidence in the sensational graft case which has stirred this city. The presentation of the evidence is now engaged on. It is thought, will occupy their time for several days and will, when finally handed to the court, finish a labor of four weeks.

BOSTON NATIONALS IN RAILROAD SMASHUP

Louisville, April 7.—A northbound passenger train on the Louisville & Nashville railroad on which the players were passengers went into an open switch at Saxton, Ky., today. William Randolph, the engineer, was killed, and the fireman and express messenger were injured, but none of the players was hurt, according to reports received here. Their only baggage, however, was so badly smashed that Owner John Dovey telegraphed to Louisville canceling Louisville's game with the White Sox and the Louisville American association team.

RUNAWAY HORSE JUMPS INTO STREETCAR

Cincinnati, O., April 7.—A runaway horse jumped through the rear entrance of a street car today, injuring six passengers. When police and firemen arrived they found the animal so tightly wedged into the car that the only way to get it out was to cut away before the horse could be extricated. Its head protruded from the lower side of the car while its hind legs hung over the upper side.

LORD KITCHENER TRAVELS AS A PRIVATE CITIZEN

San Francisco, April 7.—Traveling as a private citizen on a sightseeing tour and carefully avoiding any official recognition, Field Marshal Lord Kitchener of the British army, landed today from the steamer Mariposa, which reached port last night from Australia, where Lord Kitchener has just completed preparatory steps for a reorganization of the British colonial forces along the lines recently laid down in India. ELDER C. W. PENROSE RELEASE AS PRESIDENT OF THE EUROPEAN MISSION CABLED HIM THIS AFTERNOON

THIRTY-NINE AUTOS DESTROYED BY FIRE

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DROP IN DEATH RATE FOR MARCH

Report for Salt Lake Shows but 85 Deaths or 12 Per 1000.

THERE WERE 217 BIRTHS

Closed Doors, October, '07

The death rate in Salt Lake is lower for the month of March than since 1907, according to the monthly report of the city board of health just issued. The report shows only 85 deaths in the city during March, 1910, which is a death rate of 12 per 1,000 on an estimated population of 85,000. In March, 1909, there were 140 deaths and 115 for the same month of 1907. Last year the annual death rate per 1,000 was 19.76. Twenty-six non-residents died in Salt Lake during last month and 26 babies were shipped away for interment. There were brought here for burial 32 bodies.

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BOROUGH BANK OF BROOKLYN CLOSE

It Has a Capital of Two Hundred Thousand, More Than Two Millions in Deposits.

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At That Time Its President Howard Maxwell Was Indicted and Soon Committed Suicide.

New York, April 7.—The Borough bank of Brooklyn closed its doors today and the superintendent of banks has taken possession. The bank has a capital of \$200,000 and deposits of more than \$2,000,000. B. R. Shears is president of the institution. This is the second bank failure in Brooklyn within a week, the first being the Union bank.

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
