Burial in Des Moines—Glad Evans, a carpenter, 45 years, died of organic heart trouble at his home, 322 West First South Street, Sunday afternoon. The body will be sent to his old home in Des Moines.

Haley not a Member—It is denied by officers of the Fifteenth Infantry at Fort Douglas that Joseph Haley, the man arrested as the man who robbed Young's cafe, was a member of the Fifteenth. They say he was a member of the Twenty-ninth and was being held at Fort Douglas as a deserter.

Divorced Wife Claims Body—The funeral of Glad Evans, who committed suicide by drinking laudanum at 333 West South Temple street, was held this morning at the residence of Mrs. Smith at Pleasant Green. Bishop Spencer presiding. Mrs. Smith, the divorced wife of Smith, took charge of the body Sunday and had it sent to Pleasant Green.

Funeral of L. Lindorf—The funeral of Albert L. Lindorf, who was held at the Eber W. Hall chapel Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The burial was in Mt. Olivet. Simpkin delivered the eulogy.

Dies of Consumption—A miner from Cumberland, Wyo., giving the name of Matthew Mattson, aged 25 years, was found dead in his bed at the Angelus roominghouse Sunday morning. Death was caused by miner's consumption from which Mattson had been suffering for several weeks. The body was removed to O'Donnell's undertaking parlors and the dead man's relatives at Cumberland have been notified.

Death of Harriet Penrose—Word has been received in this city of the death at Fort Lawton, Wash., of Mrs. Harriet Penrose, widow of the late Gen. W. H. Penrose who commanded the Sixteenth United States Infantry while stationed at Fort Douglas, and was well known in Salt Lake. The general resided here after his retirement, and was buried for a year at the Fort Douglas cemetery before being removed to Arlington Heights for final interment. Mrs. Penrose resided with her son, Major Penrose, at Fort Lawton.

BROKER HAMILTON SHOTS HIMSELF

Crowded to the Wall After His Plans Fail in "Bearing" The Market.

LIVED HERE NINETEEN YEARS

Was Formerly a Grocer and Then Entered Successful Career on Stock Exchange.

James L. Hamilton, aged 45 years, a well known mining broker of this city, added to the toll of suicides last week by blowing the top of his head off in his office, 303 D. F. Walker building, Saturday afternoon. His body was discovered shortly after 5 o'clock by Archie Stevenson, one of the janitors of the building. The body was sent to O'Donnell & Co's mortuary and relatives of the suicide, residing at Cohocton, O., were immediately notified.

That Hamilton killed himself because of despondency brought on by business reverses, there is no doubt whatever. He killed himself by plunging the muzzle of a 20-20 rifle in his mouth and pulling the trigger. His head and face were badly mutilated and death was instantaneous. The exact time Hamilton shot himself is not known. The office was not locked and the body was discovered by Stevenson when he entered the room to clean it up. Apparently, the man had been dead for several hours, as rigor mortis had set in. The doctor left a personal letter to J. M. Reynolds, who is a stockbroker. Stevenson found the body lying in the corner. Hamilton had removed his coat and beside the lifeless body was the rifle with which he had killed himself. The letter to Reynolds was in the coat pocket.

Hamilton was a popular member of the stock exchange and for the past five years was a member of the governing body. For the past 18 years he roomed at the North 125 east Third South street. On March 3, he sent a note, together with some money, to Charles Lang, proprietor of the Worth, with the request that he be credited with rent until March 15. In his room were found several letters, giving information as to the whereabouts of his relatives. The suicide came here about 13 years ago from Ohio, and engaged in the grocery business with C. B. Durst. Later he became a broker and was successful until about a year ago, when he met with reverses. Recently he made an assignment in favor of his creditors. It is claimed by some of his friends that playing "bucket shops" was responsible for the despondency which led to self-destruction.

CROWDED TO THE WALL. J. M. Reynolds, who has offices with Hamilton, was notified at 11:30 of the suicide and wired that he would return as soon as possible to make arrangements for the funeral. A brother of the dead man, R. E. Hamer, who had been located at Cohocton, O., and will probably have the body sent to Ohio.

It is generally believed among mining men that Hamilton put a stop to his activity in stock companies were successful and that slowly, but surely, he was crowded to the wall, taking the chance of selling securities which had been left with him, to protect margins on rising stocks, and also issuing a check for a considerable sum when there were no funds in the bank to his credit to meet the check.

It is said that a little more than a year ago Hamilton began to "blow" and lowering quotations to suit his purposes, and it is claimed that by Jan. 1, last, he had made \$50,000. Then he started deeper than ever, through the manipulation of his opponents, stock into which he had plunged, began to rise higher and higher and Hamilton paid his margin over and over. Then he sold securities and when the check was returned from the bank unheeded, there was no little commotion.

It is said that a demand had been made upon Hamilton for the securities he held for others and that he admitted they were tied up and promised to make good in a short time; this, however, he was unable to do.
