Grand Lodge Takes Action to Provide for Needy Members.

BIG PARADE HELD YESTERDAY

Over Two Thousand Members Representing Fifty Lodges Make Brilliant Street Display.

The grand lodge of Odd Fellows decided at Tuesday afternoon's session to establish an Odd Fellows' home where widows, orphans, daughters of Rebekah and incapacitated members of the order may be cared for.

Resolved, by this grand body, that we favor the creation of a home here; the accumulation of a home fund; and the establishment of an Odd Fellows' home as soon as, to this grand body, said home may seem necessary and practicable.

The matter is being considered further today. At Tuesday afternoon's session, Grand Master W. J. Moore congratulated the order on the growth of the past year, when a membership of 1,076 had been reached.

Mrs. C. W. Field will return this week after spending the winter in California.

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
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Today's Weather Chart for United States
