

### GIFFORD PINCHOT AN OBSTRUCTIONIST

Bitterly Attacked by H. L. Doherty, President of Nineteen of Greatest Corporations.

### GREAT OBSTACLE TO REFORM

It Is the Modern Reformer, He Says—Corporation Men Don't Need A Pupilist.

St. Louis, April 21.—In an address before the league of electrical interests, Henry L. Doherty of New York, president of 19 of the greatest public service corporations in the United States, in New York, Denver, Philadelphia and other cities, bitterly attacked Gifford Pinchot as the man who has done more to prevent development of water power than any other, and a man who has been guilty of disastrous mistakes. "If Pinchot did not directly inaugurate many statements which were untrue, he, at least, by reiterating these sensational statements, managed to stir up almost universal anger on the part of the American people, and resentment on the part of the various interests accused by him. "Had our family physician made such frequent and disastrous mistakes in the diagnosis and treatment of a patient, I am afraid we would not have been as ready to forgive and forget as we were in Mr. Pinchot's case. "I regret to refer to Mr. Pinchot, personally, and I do so only to show how men of intelligence, education, broad experience and favorable environments, can fall into a popular error, due to existing agitators and the public's readiness to lend a quick ear to any charge of usurpation on the part of the wealthy people—which is always a temptation to the man seeking notoriety or having any other axe to grind." ### IF THEY HAVE BEEN BILKED KEEP FACT A SECRET

Chicago, April 2.—If wealthy Chicagoans have been victimized by foreign and American dealers in fake masterpieces of art, they have kept it a secret, according to art critics of this city, who, on hearing of the frauds of Count de Gattigny practiced on Mrs. Charles H. Paine of Boston, declared they did not know of any Chicago man or woman who had been defrauded by adventurers in art. "There are only two Rembrandts in Chicago, and there is no question about their genuineness," said Director French of the Chicago art institute yesterday. "Moreover, I have never heard of any art fakery in this city. I should think, however, that people would better look out these days for art fakes. "No Chicago has not been victimized. On the other hand, look at our collection in the art institute. Twenty years ago we bought 13 pictures from the estate of the Russian, Count Dornoff, and we paid between \$15,000 and \$200,000 for the collection. An art dealer offered \$200,000 for one of the pictures here a short time ago. The collection of 13 pictures is now worth many times what we paid for it."

### TREATMENT OF DISEASE BY MENTAL SUGGESTION

Fresno, Cal., April 22.—Rev. Dr. A. B. Shields, superintendent of St. Luke's hospital of San Francisco, and the founder there of the "Emmanuel movement" as fathered by the Episcopalian church, declared in a lecture in St. James Episcopal church here that the treatment of disease by mental suggestion at St. Luke's hospital had proved a decided success. Cures more remarkable than those effected in Boston had been made in San Francisco, he declared. Out of 200 cases treated, not one, he said, had failed of complete restoration or marked improvement. Exceptional success was met with, Dr. Shields asserted, in treating drunkards. In a hospital, said Dr. Shields, the great need in connection with the treatment is the segregation of patients, so that they will not come in contact with depressing scenes and sounds.

### FOOLED THE POLICE BOB.

Pittsburg, Pa., April 22.—A small dog frothing at the mouth stood at the center of the sidewalk on South Sixth street last night, giving spasmodic jumps and from behind a neighboring fence came barks that sounded so suspiciously human. Soon a crowd of foreign-speaking mill hands in that section surrounded the apparently mad dog. Patrolman W. J. Cleary appeared on the scene and brushed aside the crowd, he came face to face with the "mad dog." He kicked the dog before he shot it. The dog's body fell apart; sidewalk scattered over the sidewalk, the soapuds froth at the mouth spat his trousers and a juvenile cheer from behind the fence told the story.
