

SENATOR CUMMINS ON RATE MAKING

Addresses the Senate, Opposing Traffic Agreement Clause of the Railroad Bill

ALL IN FAVOR OF THE ROADS

Would Have All Rates First Submitted to Interstate Commerce Commission.

Washington, April 21.—Traffic agreements consumed the entire time given by the senate today to the railroad bill, and they were under consideration when the senate adjourned. Senator Cummins held the floor throughout.

He spoke against the action permitting such agreements and against the Crawford substitute for it.

Declaring his intention of denouncing any legislation that nullified the anti-trust law as this provision did, he said the ultimate purpose of the legislation was to allow the railroads to fix their own rates without first submitting them to the interstate commerce commission. Without the establishment of rates, any traffic agreement must be vague and of little effect.

It was difficult enough for the common people to stand against the aggressions of one railroad. To stand

against those of 10 or 20 or 30 would be more difficult still. If the rates were not to be approved in advance by the commission, then there would be no substitute for the anti-trust act, and that, he said, was the difference between the Crawford amendment and his own. It was not true, as had been stated, that President Roosevelt had advised the unconditional repeal of the anti-trust law nor that the interstate commerce commission had done so.

"The question at issue," he said, "is: Shall the agreed rates of the railroad companies go into effect without the approval of the commission?" Mr. Aldrich interrupted. He asserted

under the terms of the amendment the rates that might be specified in an agreement went into effect as did individual rates, and did not go into effect by reason of the compact.

Mr. Crawford said this was not his understanding. His opinion was the provision should require approval of the agreement before the rates took effect.

Mr. Aldrich said that by none of the propositions of the bill could a rate be fixed by an agreement, because all of the rates must be subject to the control which the commission had over their rates.

"You propose by indirection to give the commission the right indefinitely to suspend rates to stand here and there, if it so desired."

Replying, Mr. Cummins said his complaint was against the permission to the railroads to enter into agreements that may become effective without the previous approval of the commission. In such agreements, he argued, there was no opportunity for individual initiative. The two classes of rates could not be placed on the same level, and he urged that if the anti-trust law was to be repealed, a better remedy must be found than that provided by the bill as it stood.

Mr. Ekins said Mr. Cummins's contention for approval of rates in advance was impracticable and absurd. He said that from 8,000 to 10,000 people were now employed by the railroads in establishing rates, and he asserted that the interstate commerce commission must have a great force of experts to carry out Mr. Cummins's idea.

"I am not ready to stand here and destroy the entire freight traffic structure of the railroads," he said, "and I do not believe the people demand we should do so."

He said he did not want the anti-trust law repealed, but he did desire to assist in relieving the executives of this embarrassment they find themselves under in enforcing the law.

INCREASE IN TRADE WITH THE PHILIPPINES

Washington, April 2.—An increase of about 65 per cent of the total trade in domestic merchandise between the United States and the Philippine islands during the eight months ending Feb. 28 last, as compared with the corresponding period of the preceding year, is recorded by the bureau of statistics. The enormous increase is attributed by the bureau to the removal of tariff duties on domestic merchandise passing between the United States and the islands.

The value of such products shipped from the United States to the Philippines during the period mentioned was \$10,151,276 against \$6,871,764 in the corresponding months of last year. The value of merchandise imported into the United States from the islands was \$11,420,475 against \$7,076,132 last year.

This increase in that trade with the Philippines, the bureau said, practically equalled the gain in the commerce between the United States and all other portions of its non-contiguous territory in the same period.
