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AGED MAN KILLED BY AN AUTOMOBILE

Wilbur Willard Struck by Car Driven by C. Paumie in West Temple.

ARRESTED, THEN RELEASED Tells Some Stories About "Big Griffin"

Lieut. Brimmer Believes Driver Not to Blame After Hearing Story of the Accident.

A fatal automobile accident occurred Friday evening in West Temple street between Fourth and Fifth South streets, the victim being H. Wilbur Willard, a real estate dealer, aged 75 years, residing at 437 east First South street.

Willard was riding on a Poplar Grove car, J. R. Korner, conductor. He stepped from the car and started across the street when the automobile, traveling at a low rate of speed, struck him.

Willard was picked up by a patrolman. He was carried into the residence of W. A. Wallace, 48 South West Temple street, where Dr. J. H. Robinson was summoned, also Miss L. L. Willard, a sister.

An examination showed that Willard had been struck on the back of the head, but the physician said the injury did not appear to be very serious and that the man would recover provided he was not receiving a fracture of the skull at the base of the brain.

Shortly after the accident, Paumie was taken into custody by Patrolman Wire. Paumie explained that he was in the automobile with his wife and daughter and was not driving more than eight miles an hour.

Willard was born in New York in 1835, and came here 45 years ago and was interested in real estate and "mining." He was married to Mrs. M. J. Willard, who is an artist, he leaves two other sisters, Mrs. H. A. Hadley of Havana, Cuba, and Mrs. N. E. Hollister of Colma, Wis.
