From the musty records of a general store operated about the year 1800 in eastern New York-not 100 miles from Albany-the writer has been able to secure some interesting figures show ing that at that period meats and othing that at that period meats and other home products were "dirt" cheap, although imported commodities were eften quite high. Imported liquors, however, drawn from the wood and sold by the gallon, could be pought almost at the cost of a quart today.

Of course dry goods and wearing apparel of all kinds were quite expensive, a yard of calico costing 40 to 50 cents, linen 50 cents and up; a bandanna handkerchief or a pair of common stockings cost \$7½ cents, and a pair of silk stockings \$1.50.

Day laborers received at this period three shillings or 37½ cents. Twenty to 25 years later work by the day was sometimes credited as high as \$1.25.

Monthly wages, presumably with board, ranged from \$4 to \$24, although \$7 and \$8 was a common price. One account shows that a gardener was paid \$5 per month. Yearly contracts appear at \$50 and \$100. Women in service received six to seven shillings per week (75 to 87½ cents) and a seamstress, working at the house, was paid 31 cents per day.

Promised security from fire cannot be guaranteed. This assertion will come as a surprise and disappointment to the general public, which has come to regard certain modern structures as perfectly safe so far as danger from fire is concerned. "The article from which the quotation is made was suggested by the burning out of several floors and the serious damage to others in the recent fire in a large apartment house in New York city, acknowledged to be one of the latest and best types. It is true the exterior of the building did not present a decidedly wrecked appearance after the conflagration, says Popular Magazine. "The expectation that a fire would be confined to the room in which it started, or to that floor, at most, proved a mistake. Apartments contain, and are usually overcrowded with furniture and articles of an extremely inflammable nature. When once these commenced to blaze, the heat was so intense as to extend through the floor above and cause another fire there, and so on to the top. The control and subjugation of a fire in any large building chiefly depends upon the carrying out of the architect's plan to confine the fire. This contemplates the closing of all doors and windows; but when occupants are making a hurried exit, many of them fail to observe the filled with inflammable.

"As long as our rooms continue to be filled with inflammable articles just to long will our fire proof apartments be little more than slow burning, although that condition is a decided step in advance, and ordinarily would enable the escape of its occupants."
