LOCAL BRIEFS.

Sons of Veterans Meet—The Sons of Veterans will meet Friday night in Odd Fellows hall to arrange for a Fourth of July celebration.

Inspecting Incinerator—Dr. S. G. McConaughy left this afternoon for Seattle to inspect the garbage incinerator in operation at that place. If it proves a good thing, one like it will be installed in this city.

To Unite in Work—A conference was held Tuesday afternoon between the forestry, reclamation and weather service of the government in this city, relative to sympathetic work in Little Cottonwood canyon.

Applies for State Water—Ralph S. Marioneaux of Whitehorse, Utah, has applied to the state engineer to use water from Whitehorse river for irrigation purposes during the months between March and November.

Boys Committed—Two boys, aged 17 years, were committed to the industrial school by Judge McMaster of the juvenile court Tuesday for incorrigibility, though sentence was suspended in both cases during good behavior.

Schools near Completion—According to the contractors, the new Granite high school will be ready for occupancy by the fall term. The new high school gymnasium is also showing rapid progress and will probably be ready by September.

Summer Has Begun—Tuesday was the longest day in the year, when the sun reached the furthest point in his journey north of the equator. It will remain stationary a few days, and then begin its trip south, not to stop until Dec. 21 next.

Address to Relief Society—At the afternoon session of the Relief society of Liberty, Judge McMaster Thursday delivered an address of interest to those interested in juvenile court work and the reclamation of wayward boys and girls generally.

Funeral of Damon Adams—The funeral of Damon R. Adams was held this afternoon at 3 p. m. from St. Mark's cathedral, with interment at Mt. Olivet. There was a large attendance, and many expressions of sympathy and deep regret at the death of so promising a young man.

State Well for Cedar City—The state board of land commissioners Tuesday discussed a proposed United Cedar City, Iron county, for the purpose of deciding on the matter of driving an experimental well in that locality, though it was not decided when the trip would be made.

Out Door Hour Planned—The state university summer school students will indulge in an out of doors hour on June 26 under the supervision of the physical director. The hour will include miscellaneous games and activities. Registration has reached 916, which is 100 more than the number last year.

Commencement at St. Mary's—Very Rev. Dean Harris delivered the baccalaureate address Tuesday afternoon, before the graduating class of St. Mary's academy, and Rev. P. N. Cushman presided. The ceremony of the diplomas, a fine program was carried out. The assembly room was crowded with interested patrons.

Vets Name Delegates—The Spanish war veterans chose Tuesday night, Robert Keeton, H. J. Jorgensen, James Hall and B. P. Ek as delegates to the third annual convention of the Utah division. The veterans also decided to parade July 24 with a float consisting of a mounted Spanish gun captured during the war.

Labor Trouble at Bingham—Labor difficulties at the Highland Boy mine at Bingham, yesterday, are being settled. Sheriff Sharp yesterday for additional deputies. The trouble which has arisen on account of the demand of the miners for higher wages, is being settled by a representative of the Western Federation of Labor gave a stirring speech before the miners a short time ago.

NEW HOSPITAL FOR COUNTY INFIRMARY

According to Plans It Will Consist of Three Stories and Basement With Modern Equipment.

Those who are acquainted with conditions here with joy the decision of the county commissioners to erect a hospital in connection with the county infirmary. According to the plans the hospital will consist of three stories and a basement, and though it is to be modern in every respect, the approximate cost has not yet been determined.

C. V. Anderson, superintendent of the county infirmary, presented to the board yesterday that the hospital would save in actual cash the cost necessary to erect it, on account of the fact that much money is spent by the county for doctors' fees and medical attendance in local hospitals. During the past year, the different hospitals handled on an average of 20 patients each day for hospital care, at a yearly expenditure of between \$5,000 and \$6,000. The crowded and unsatisfactory condition of the county infirmary can be appreciated only by a personal visit to the main building, for instance, there are 15 ordinary rooms which house 35 women patients, a variety of sick, thin, dispirited and emaciated. In the room's building conditions are even worse. The building contains three wards, 20x75 feet, and two 20x50 feet. In the largest ward there are 10 beds and in the smaller wards 12 beds. Among the men are those suffering from tuberculosis, contractable diseases, rheumatism, paralysis and insanity.

On the first floor of the hospital as proposed will be a smoking room, a dispensary and sick rooms, on the second floor will be a ward for consumptive and infectious cases and on the third floor will be an operating room complete.

ANOTHER PIONEER CALLED. John F. Cahoon Died Tuesday After Prolonged Suffering.

John F. Cahoon, a '48 pioneer, and trooper in Lot Smith's Indian fighters, died Tuesday afternoon, at his Central avenue home, from Bright's disease, with which he has been suffering for several months. The funeral will be held from the residence of his daughter, Mrs. A. G. Angell, 54 Second East street, Thursday, at 2 p. m., with burial in City cemetery. The deceased was born in Illinois, in 1839, being brought to Utah with his parents when 3 years old, from Nauvoo. For a number of years he was a car builder at the local railroad shops, afterwards engaging in general contracting until three years ago, when his strength began to fail. Mr. Cahoon leaves five sons, John S., William F., James S., and Hyde S., all of this city, and Roy Cahoon of Bountiful. William F. Cahoon is a city fireman. Transfer company is a brother, and a sister, Mrs. Vilate Angell, is living in Los Angeles.
